MORE SEE CRATER L. Attendance Reported 50 Per Cent Greater Than Last Year

CRATER LAKE, July 16.—Attendance at Crater Lake is 50 per cent better than it was at this time last year, and an excellent year is predicted, according to R. W. Price, vice president of the Crater Lake Park company. Price said the attendance on July 4 was about the same as last year, and that the crowd Sunday was the largest so far this year, over 100 being registered at the lodge.

The capacity of the lodge and tent-houses is about 250, and 30 additional tent-houses are being erected this year to help accommodate the crowds. Work has begun on the 60-room addition to the lodge by Contractor F. P. Salters. There will be 60 new rooms on the first floor, 20 with bath and toilet, 20 with toilet and 20 with hot and cold water. There will also be 20 rooms in the attic for employees.
