California Shipments Going East Despite Railroad Strike

SACRAMENTO, July 13.—Fresh fruit is going east as usual in spite of the strike, according to officials of the various fruit companies today. They stated that eastern buyers were a little slow at bidding at the present time because of the inadequate shipping facilities during the strike.

MUCH JEWELRY UNCLAIMED

LOS ANGELES, July 12.—More than \$1,000,000 worth of automobiles, watches, jewelry and other articles remain in the custody of the local police department because the owners cannot properly identify what belongs to them, according to Police Statistician L. W. Lyons.

"Only \$800,972.72 worth of stolen articles, out of the \$1,809,541.21 worth recovered from thieves during the past twelve months, have been returned to the owners," said Lyons. "At least another million dollars' worth could have been returned if the owners had kept a record of the number of their watches, cameras, guns and other personal belongings."

FORMER RESIDENT KILLED

News of the death of Terry Willard, 22, from injuries received while working in the woods near Marshfield, reached here this morning in a telegram to his mother, Mrs. S. C. Chintell. Willard had made his home in Klamath Falls since childhood until a few months ago when he went to Marshfield to work for a lumber company there, having been thrown out of work by the closing of the Klamath Falls mills. Details of the accident have not been received by his family. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Chintell and a step-father, and by a sister, Aletha Christenson. A body will be brought here for burial, the funeral having been set for Sunday afternoon.
