In the Matter of the Report of Commissioners appointed to assess benefits and damages if any, to the lands within Meadows Drainage District, Klamath County. Now on this day this matter coming on to be heard upon the report of the Commissioners heretofore appointed by this court to inspect the lands within the Meadows Drainage District and to assess benefits and damages against the said lands under the "Plan of Reclamation" heretofore filed in this court; And it appearing to the court that the Commissioners herein appointed by this court in this matter to-wit: Don J. Zumwalt, D. W. Ryan and J. W. Utter only qualified as such under their appointment and filed with the clerk in this court their oath of office and entered upon the discharge of their duties as such commissioners as the law in all respects required; and it appearing to the court that said commissioners have made, signed and filed the report of their actions as such commissioners, which said report filed with the clerk of this court upon the 6th day of May A. D. 1922, and that after said report was filed the clerk of this court gave due and legal notice of the filing of said report by publication in the Evening Herald a newspaper printed and published in Klamath County, Oregon for a period of four weeks the first



publication of said notice being upon the 10th day of May, 1922, and the last publication being upon the 31st day of May, 1922, due proof of the publication of said notice, having been filed with the clerk of this court upon the 1st day of June, 1922; that in and by said notice all persons interested were ordered and directed to file exceptions to all or any part of said Commissioners Report on or before the 12th day of June, A. D. 1922; And it appearing to the court that no person or persons interested in the lands within the said Meadows Drainage District or in any of the matters contained in said report appeared to object or file any exceptions or other pleadings in this matter, after a full investigation of all matters and things presented by said Commissioners Report and the "Plans for Reclamation" of the said Meadows Drainage District and the estimate of the cost of said reclamation and the court having made and entered its findings of fact and conclusions of law herein and being fully advised in the premises as to what decree it should enter.

It is therefore hereby Ordered, Adjudged and Decreed that the Report of Commissioners of the Meadows Drainage District as filed in these proceedings be, and the same is hereby approved and confirmed, and the lands within the boundary of the Meadows Drainage District will be benefited to the amount and to the extent set forth in said Commissioners report with no resulting damage, except as noted in said report.

And it is further ordered and decreed that the "Plans for Reclamation" of the lands of the district as adopted by the Board of Supervisors, is also approved and confirmed by the court; and the clerk of this court is hereby directed to enter this decree upon the journal of this court and to transmit a certified copy of same and a copy of the "Commissioners Report" to the secretary of Board of Supervisors of Meadows Drainage District and also file with the Recorder of Klamath County, Oregon a certified copy of this decree and report of said commissioners.
