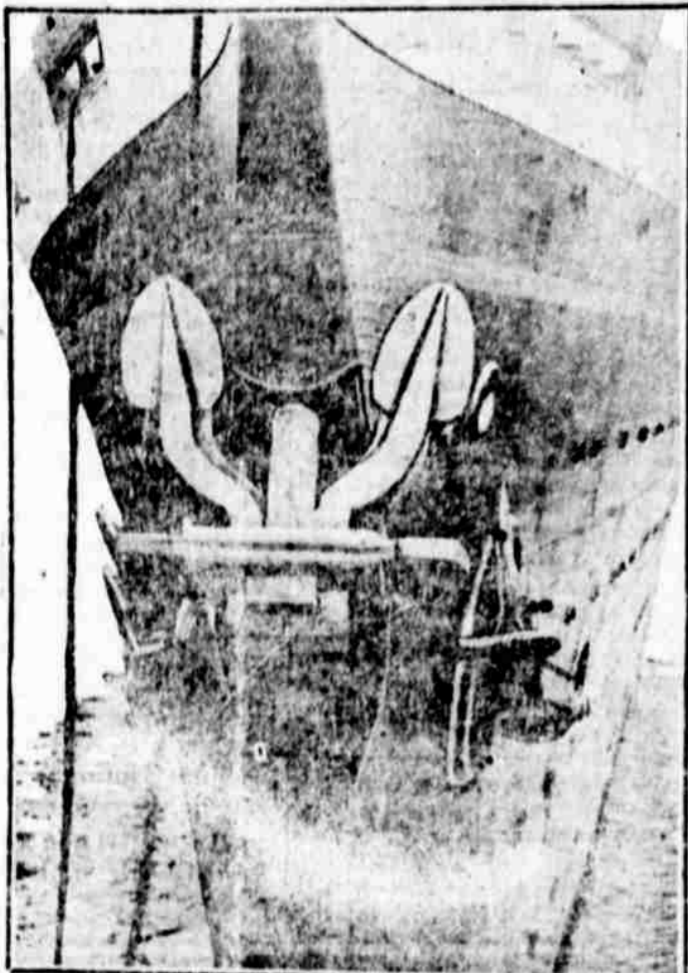

Wally's Influence



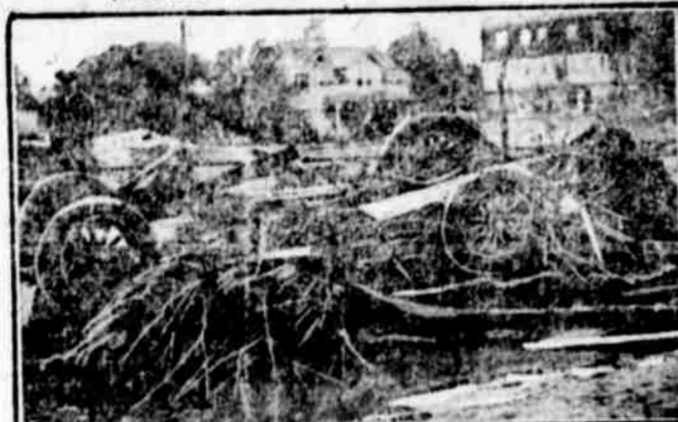
Jackie Coogan was just like all other kids until he heard Wally Field and then he demanded a saxophone all for himself. The kid's reception parlor is now in the back yard.

Ty Cobb Gets Tiger for the Tigers



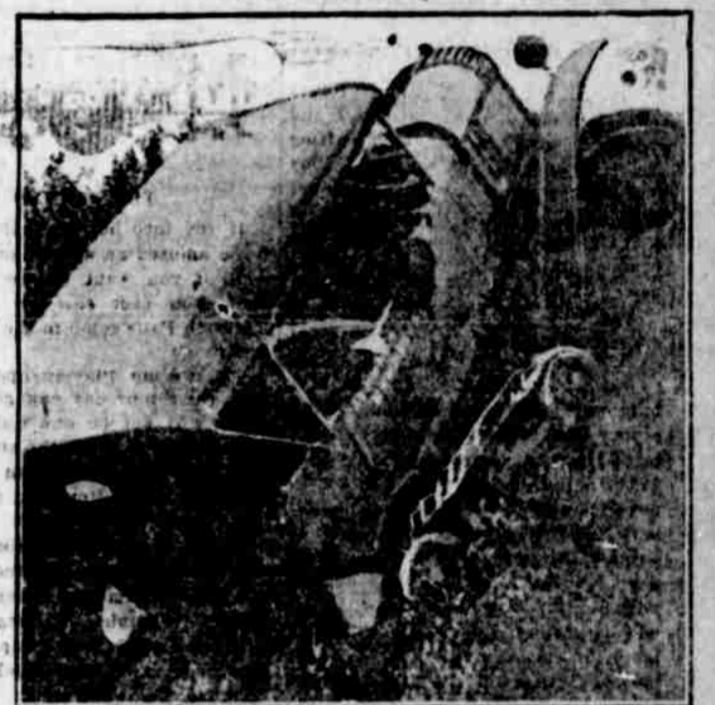
Alfred Walker (left) gave Ty Cobb (center) a tiger cub the other day to bring the Detroit club luck in its chase for the American League pennant.

U. S. GOODS ARE AID TO THIEVES

Large Quantity of Goods Find Way Into Markets Of Europeans

RIGA, Aug. 2.—The so-called "thieves markets" of Europe are today crowded with the product of American factories. When the American army went home, enormous stocks of equipment of various kinds were disposed of in France and Germany, by sale and otherwise, and much of this surplus has found its way to the many open air gatherings of the continent where men and women bargain for a miscellaneous mass of articles under the tacit understanding that one must not inquire whence the things come.

In the market of Riga, covering an acre of two blocks, there are offered for sale daily large quantities of United States army paraphernalia, particularly clothing, and sanitary articles bearing the names of different American relief organizations. American phonographs give daily concerts of American airs, which invariably attract the crowds from the music of competitors with their German machines playing Russian tunes. American sewing machines, too, are on sale in some stalls, and in others there are American made knives and forks vying with German, Polish and Russian manufactured goods of the same kind. Also there are thou-

sands of old and worn collars, still carrying the mark which gives their birthplace as Troy, New York. The purchaser takes his pick at his own price, provided he can reach an understanding with the polyglot storekeeper, who will bargain with him in any one or the four of five languages now current in the streets of Riga.

CATTLE PRICES CLIMB

Period of Depression Believed By Cattlemen to Be at End

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 2.—The cattle business has reached the bottom of a period of depression and the next seven or eight years should see an upward climb in prices and profits to cattlemen, according to a survey of the history of cattle production made by the California Cattlemen's association, which predicts that relatively high prices will be reached again in 1930.

The association believes that the shortage of cattle will keep up the price of breeding stock and that with the increased demand for meat expected to result from the organization of meat councils in large cities and from the advertising of meat by the National Livestock and Meat board there will continue to be a real shortage of beef.

Beef prices were high in 1871, 1885, 1900 and 1919, and low in 1877, 1895 and 1909, the association reports, making regular fluctuations in periods of fifteen years. Consequently high prices are predicted for 1930.

MINE SWEEPERS TO BE REMODELED FOR GEODETIC SURVEY

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2.—Two former mine sweepers, turning from the pursuits of war to those of peace and science, are being remodeled in Delaware river shipyards, and are nearly ready to weigh anchor to start on an indefinitely long cruise in the Pacific ocean for the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey.

They are steamers Pioneer and Discoverer, formerly the Auk and the Osprey, which saw service in the North Sea. Now they are to be equipped with the finest scientific instruments for sounding and surveying.

Some time during the summer they are to pass through the Panama canal and proceed up the Pacific coast to Alaska to sound and survey uncharted territory.

Contrary to general belief, it was said, there still remains much uncharted territory in that region, and many places show channels incorrectly marked and sounded. Also some places once correctly surveyed and sounded, have been altered by the constant action of the waves.

Eleven officers and 53 men have been enlisted to man each vessel, and with the exception of the two commanding officers the crews have been selected.

The Coast and Geodetic Survey has taken over also a third mine sweeper, the Flamingo, from the Navy department, now living at Portsmouth, N. H., enlisting a crew. Following alterations, she probably will join her sister ships in Alaskan waters.

WHAT VIENNA DRINKS TO QUENCH ITS THIRST

VIENNA, Aug. 2.—This city consumed in the past year 113,992,500 liters of beer, 46,357,000 liters of wine and 2,456,000 of spirits, according to figures just published. Taking the population at nearly 2,000,000 this was a per capita consumption of 62 liters of beer, 25 of wine, and four of spirits, a total of 91 liters, or a little over 95 quarts.
