HORSE WILL BE DEBATE SUBJECT

Question to Come Before Annual Convention of Team, Truck Owners

DETROIT, Aug. 3.—Resolved: That the horse is a pre-historic animal, that his functions have been taken over by the motor truck and that civilization has no further need for him in the cities.

This well might be the subject of a debate on which the horse is expected to stand or fall and that will be one of the highlights of the annual convention of the national team and motor truck owners' association, to be held at Cedar Rapids, Ohio, August 7-9.

F. L. Henk of Detroit, secretary of the national organization, is authority for the statement that the question of bringing the horse back into popularity for the short haul of freight and express in the cities is likely to be decided at the convention. Lovers of the horse will vie with proponents of gasoline driven vehicles in the debate.

Wayne Dinamore of Chicago, secretary of the horse association of America and an ardent champion of the animal, is to take the negative side of the debate, while F. W. Fenn of New York, secretary of the motor truck division of the national association of commercial clubs has been invited to cite figures intended to show that the horse is losing in popularity in the cities.

According to Mr. Henk some expression on the future course of truck operators in the cities may be expected following the verbal tilts. Among other subjects to be discussed at the convention will be a proposal, emanating it is said from Baltimore, that railroads deliver freight directly to department stores. Mr. Henk said his organization would oppose the plan.
