

INDemnITY MAY AID STUDENTS

Japan And England May Adopt U. S. Plan for Spending Excess Funds

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The Washington government for 14 years has been expending its share of the excess indemnities from China for the benefit and support of Chinese students in the United States. Japan has now come forward with a similar proposal and Great Britain may follow suit.

A departmental committee, of which Sir John Jordan, former British minister at Peking, is chairman, is considering the idea of Great Britain foregoing her indemnity installment, due this year, provided China expend it for educational purposes at home. The government is thought to be favorably inclined. Japan also has said she was prepared to forego her share of the Chinese indemnity under the same stipulations.

There is no question of foregoing the right to the indemnity, indemnity, either by Japan or Great Britain, and if the present proposals materialize the two governments would save the money is actually held by the Chinese authorities for the stipulated educational purposes.

The excess indemnities were exacted in 1901 by the powers for the attacks in China in 1900 and 1900 upon foreigners and native Christians. A total of 11 countries, including Great Britain, the United States, France, Italy, Russia and Japan, receive yearly allotments. The expiration date of the indemnities is 1945.

SWEDEN BUILDS RADIO STATION

New York Firm Enters Bid For Equipment for 'Gigantic Plant'

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 7.—Apply for your wavelength now, or you will be left out in the cold," was the warning advice given to Sweden by E. T. W. Alexandersson, of New York, chief engineer of the Radio Corporation of America, who is making a brief business visit to Sweden, his native land. The Radio Corporation has entered its bid for delivery of apparatus and equipment for the new high-power wireless station which Sweden is now building on its west coast.

In an interview with the Stockholm press, Mr. Alexandersson, a well-known radio expert, explained that only an extremely limited number of trans-Atlantic radio stations could be operated successfully without serious interference. He said that various countries had already reserved most of the wavelengths suitable for trans-Atlantic communication, and only a few were left. The wave-lengths best suited for such long distance transmission, are between 10,000 and 20,000 meters. The wave length between 11,500 and 17,000 meters have been reserved, while Poland has applied for the 18,000 meter length.

Mr. Alexandersson declared that in his opinion radio traffic should be monopolized by the various governments of the world. Otherwise, he said, the confusion in the air will become so great that all radio service may ultimately be rendered impossible.

The awarding of wave-lengths to trans-Atlantic stations is now made by an international commission whose next session will probably be held in London this year.

Subterranean River Found in Switzerland

GENEVA, Aug. 7.—A great subterranean river, with an outflow of 27,000 gallons of water a minute, has been discovered in the Mont Blanc region. Known as Eau Belles, this river has thrown out many underground tributaries which have formed small lakes and wells of extremely pure and cold water in the some of the southern cantons of southeast districts of France and in Switzerland.

The origin of the river is the ancient lower glaciers of Mont Blanc which it has been proved flow from the bottom as well as the top, the latter supplying indirectly the Rhone and the Rhine.

The waters of Eau Belles at a depth of 25 to 50 yards beneath the mountains have carved out wonderful and beautiful caverns, grottoes and cascades full of stalactites of stalagmites.

Alaska Bank Goes On Nickle and Dime Basis for First Time

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 7.—The first National bank of Fairbanks, the last bank in the United States to get off the "two-bit" basis of small change, went on a "nickle and dime" basis on July 1, as a result of the closing of the railroad, which brought transportation, commerce and finance alike to the necessity of using smaller change than a quarter.

"Old-timers will hate getting used to this small change game" says the Fairbanks News Miner, in discussing the innovation, "but when you think about it it is the best for everybody, especially for youths who will be the business men of the camp in a year or two. It is not business to figure no lower than a two-bit piece, and anyone who thinks can realize this at a glance, for they must know it now. You must figure in pennies and play the game that way if you get ahead much and right."

Ale House of Dickens Days Offered For Sale

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The Leather Bottle, known to Dickens lovers the world over, is for sale. It is the "clean and commodious ale-house" in the little Kent village of Cobham. It was thither Mr. Pickwick, accompanied by the faithful Snodgrass and Winkle, followed Mr. Tupman on receipt of the plaintive letter from Mr. Tupman which announced that he had been "deserted" by a lovely and fascinating creature. He wrote to Pickwick: "Any letter addressed to me at 'The Leather Bottle,' Cobham, Kent," will be forwarded—supposing I still exist. I hasten from the sight of the world which has become odious to me."

The old inn contains many Dickens relics. The hanging sign bears a picture of Pickwick addressing the club. The old-fashioned shutters which are still fitted to the small windows help to preserve the old world air which Dickens loved so much that he frequently brought down to Cobham parties of his friends to whom he exhibited all the old-time delights of The Leather Bottle.

Dickens loved the Cobham neighborhood so much that he returned to it for his honeymoon. Later he took up his residence at Gad's Hill, close by.
