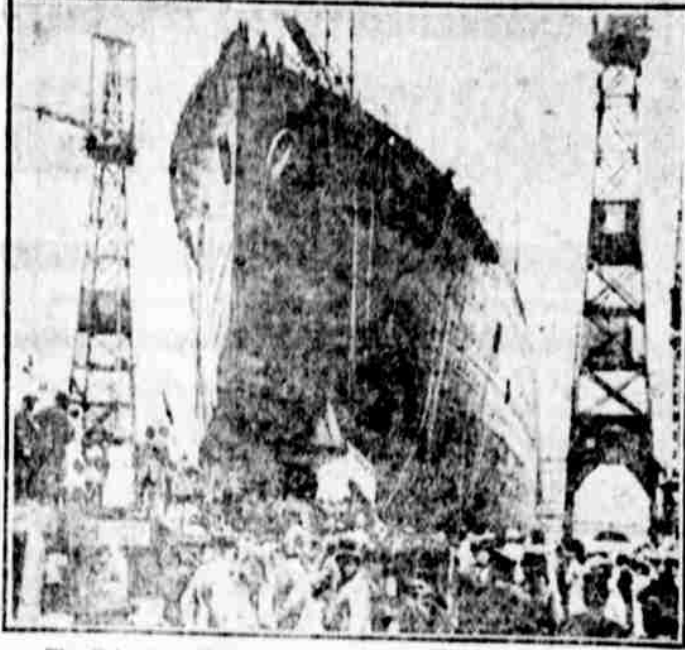

## Where Hundreds Faced Death



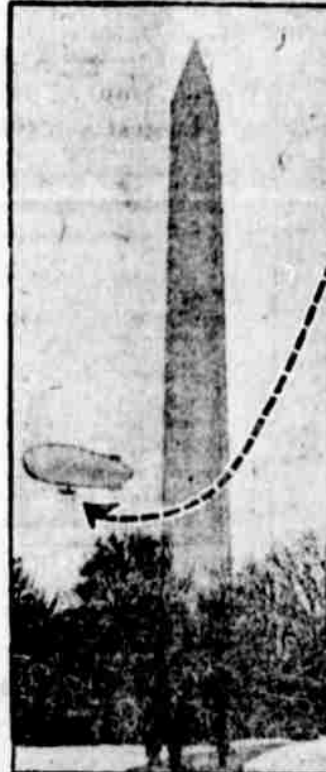

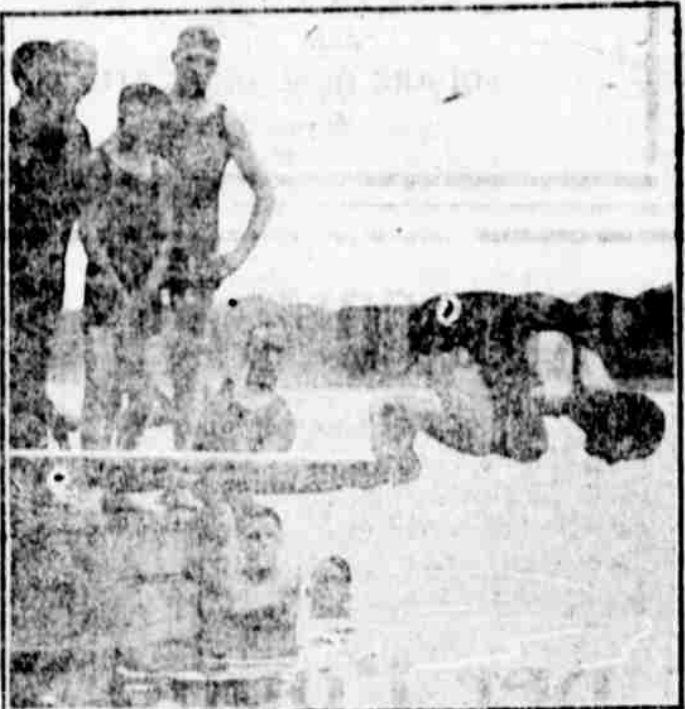

## Barnyard Champ



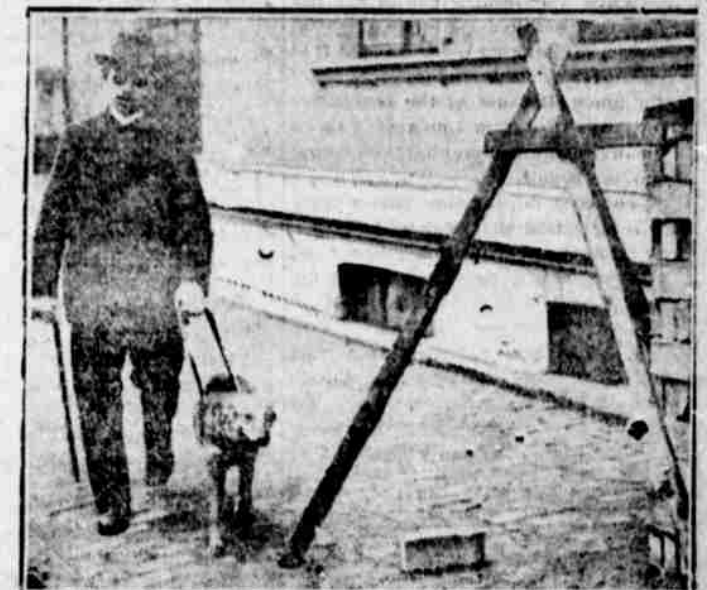
