

DORRIS, /Aug. 18 .- Fire 21 5:30 yesterday afte moon totally destroyed the box factory here of the Associated Lumber & Box company with a loss estimated at \$116,000, believed to be covered by insurance. The fire was believed to have originated in the open enwoust burner from which the burning sawdust was blown by a high wind into the factory where the fire gained strong headway before being observed.

About 500,000 feet of Tinished Sox shook, of an estimated value of \$20. 000, which was located in an adjoining warehouse, was also totally destroyed. Three million feet of lumber nearby was saved.

Efforts to extinguish the fire falled through low pressure of the city water supply.

The plant of the Dorris Lumber & Box company about 150 yards distant was threatened for a time but was saved.

Medford Mayor Places G. O. P. Above All Other Organizations

MEDFORD, Aug. 18 .- Mayor C. II. (Pop) Gates of this city throw a bomb into the gathering of republicans at a huge banquet at the Madford hotel Wednesday night, given in honor of Republican State Chairman Walter L. Tooze, Jr., and exploded all the surmises, guesses, rumors, and statements that Cates might be an independent candidate for governor. when, in welcoming Tooze to the city, the mayor publicly aserted that he placed the interests of the republican party above any personal interest, or the interests of any other organization, and that he proposed to support the republican ticket in the fall election from top to bottom.

Can't Desert Party

Gates said: "God knows I am independent enough, but not enough so that I can get along without the republican party."

This statement on the part of Medford's two fisted mayor created a decided sensation and caused a thrill to pass through the large assemblage. Sensation after sensation featured the meeting, and when Bert Anderson, one of the leading republican war horses of southern Oregon, and she but recently resigned from the state fish and game commission stated that he proposed to see that the local republican organization, as well as himself, accepted the leadership of the present republican state chairman, and joined loyally with him in electing the republican ticket from top to bottom, pledging his utmost aid to the end, enthusiasm ran riot.

No one man or set of men should allow their personal feelings to cause them to do an act that would forever injure the one great party to which we as republicans owe our allegiance.
