

NATION TO BACK RAILROADS

ALL POWERS OF GOVERNMENT TO BE PUT IN USE

President Declares Purpose in Address to Congress Coal Probe is Asked

WASHINGTON Aug. 18.—President Harding today told congress and the nation that he had resolved to use all the power of the government to maintain transportation and to sustain the right of men to work.

National investigation for constructive recommendations to conduct the coal industry be imperative and he recommended a government commission to advise fair wages and conditions.

"Government by law must and will be maintained, no matter what storms may ensue, no matter what hardships may attend or what sacrifice may be necessary," the president said.

Stating that sympathetic railroad strikes had developed and had impaired interstate commerce seriously, the president said trains had been deserted on the desert and had revealed what he declared to be cruelty and contempt for law on the part of some railroad employes.

"There is state lawlessness shocking every conception of American law and order," he declared and announced his intention to invoke laws, civil and criminal, forbidding conspiracies hindering interstate commerce and requiring safety in railway service.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The strike of the railroad craft unions must be settled here, Stone declared today at an informal meeting before the mediation conference.

TOOZE PREDICTS CLEAN SWEEP FOR REPUBLICAN PARTY

Chairman of State Central Committee Heartens Members of Party Here

Republicans who met Walter Tooze, Jr., chairman of the state central committee, here yesterday are heartened at his report of conditions as he finds them on his state tour.

Seventeen members, or about half of the county central committee conferred with the state chairman at the city hall for several hours yesterday afternoon and arranged details of organization.

"If a political party does not stand for those things that will bear the closest scrutiny it is not entitled to succeed and will not long endure," was a truth called to the meeting's attention by Tooze.

By publicly affiliating with the party, he said, the individual, impliedly at least, pledges himself or herself to abide by the party as looked upon as a sacred trust and faithfully discharged through support of the nominees selected to represent the party at the primary.

Between now and November it is planned to organize the state, precinct by precinct.

Each county committee is urged to select a woman as vice-chairman; each precinct will have a woman chief of staff as well as a male committeeman and these will choose a corps of workers to see that the

FIRE DESTROYS BOX PLANT OF ASSOCIATED CO.

Dorris Factory Is Total Loss; 500,000 Feet of Shook Burned

'POP' GATES TO REMAIN LOYAL TO HIS PARTY

Medford Mayor Places G. O. P. Above All Other Organizations

MEDFORD, Aug. 18.—Mayor C. E. (Pop) Gates of this city threw a bomb into the gathering of republicans at a huge banquet at the Medford hotel Wednesday night, given in honor of Republican State Chairman Walter L. Tooze, Jr., and exploded all the surmises, guesses, rumors, and statements that Gates might be an independent candidate for governor.

Gates said: "God knows I am independent enough, but not enough so that I can get along without the republican party."

This statement on the part of Medford's two titled mayor created a decided sensation and caused a thrill to pass through the large assemblage.

In introducing Tooze, Gates said: "I am going to place my party principles above the mental injury caused by the thrust of a political javelin."

"For the past ten years previous to each election, we have had the same people attempting to bring discord into the republican organization. Prior to the last four years our republican organization was hanging upon a thread. At no time did we feel that we could deliver a solid formation to the state organization."

Same Old Tactics

"During the last four years our organization has been intact at all times. But now when our organization is needed as it never has been needed before, we find the same opposition creeping in, attempting to change the minds of true republicans from the course which they should by all rights pursue.
