REAL PARTY SPIRIT

WHEN Mayor C. E. Gates of Medford, who was severely disciplined by Governor Olcott and who has been relied upon by foes of the republican party to bolt, has the red-blooded courage to stand up in meeting and declare that he holds the welfare of the party far above his own interests and feelings, an example is set that should thrill the soul of every bona fide exponent of republican principles.

There is no possibility of defeating an organization which breeds men of Gates' breadth of vision and strength of character.

Such a bombshell, coming immediately on the heels of the Hall recount fiasco and its revelation of methods as shown by the expose in precinct 201 in Multnomah, would shake the courage of the stoutest of them.

The republican party, after a stormy trial, is again riding smoothly, and despite all the machinations that will be employed against it between now and November, it is coming into port with all the crew aboard.

Yacht Club Members
Will Exhibit Their
Building in Mobile

PENSACOLA, Florida, Aug. 18.—The new home of the Pensacola Yacht club, a handsome concrete structure, is about ready for occupancy and the club members think so well of it that when they make the next trip to Mobile in a boat they will take the club house along with them to show it to the yachtsmen of the Alabama city.

It is a floating clubhouse. The club has just purchased for less than \$10,000 the army quartermaster motorship General William Wilson, a concrete vessel 136 feet in length which the government built at an expense of \$350,000. The Wilson is equipped with two powerful gasoline motors which cost Uncle Sam \$30,000 each and virtually is a new vessel, having made only one voyage since it was launched. Its only journey was a trip by easy stages from New York to Pensacola but the voyage proved to be the undoing of the vessel.

The motors consumed 50 gallons of gasoline an hour and even Uncle Sam's bank account would not stand for that. On arrival of the vessel here it was tied up and a recent advertisement for bids for a ship resulted in the local yacht club becoming interested.

The club for many years had dreamed of a floating club house eventually but even the most optimistic members did not contemplate one of concrete or one that could be moved without the assistance of a tug, and when it was learned the Wilson was on the market members proceeded to file a bid.

Trained Hayward Is Ardent Fisherman

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 18.—William "Bill" Hayward, veteran athletic trainer of the University of Oregon, who is known all over the United States on account of his success in training athletic teams, is an ardent fisherman, and never fails to bring in a big string of rainbow trout whenever he spends a day in whipping the water of streams in Oregon and other parts of the west.

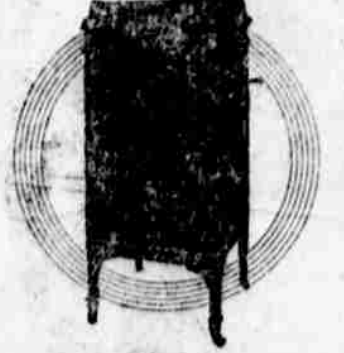
