Star Athletes From Many States Coming For Sacramento Meet

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—Star athletes from several states are expected to compete in the far western invitational track and field meet to be held at Sacramento September 8 and 9 as a feature of the California state fair.

Herbert Hauser, San Francisco, secretary of the Pacific association of the amateur athletic union, under whose auspices the meet is to be held, expects that the meet will be not only an annual affair but that next year it will be incorporated in the national A. A. U. championships, which Sacramento may make a bid for.

All the star college and high school athletes will compete. "Tiny" Hartranft, Stanford University weight man who holds the national intercollegiate shot put title, and Bud Hauser, Oxnard high school boy who holds the national intercollegiate shot will compete on the Los Angeles athletic club team. Charles Paddock, the world's fastest human, may also run for the southern team.

The University of California will have about forty men entered at Sacramento, according to Hauser. "Brick" Muller, Henderson, Hendrixson, Bob Hutchison, Charlie Dorr and others who won the 1922 intercollegiate title for the state university will be on the team. Jack Merchant, having graduated last spring.

Efforts are being made to have the Multnomah amateur athletic club of Portland enter the meet.

An added event this year will be a half-mile relay for high schools, four men to a team.

Oregon University Women Will Replace Burned Collection

EUGENE, Aug. 22.—A campaign has been begun by the women of Eugene and the alumnae of the University of Oregon to gather materials essential to the work of the normal and industrial arts department of the university to replace that which was destroyed when the art building on the university campus burned a few weeks ago.

The collection, destroyed in the fire was obtained only after many years of gathering. As it is said that it will be necessary to have such articles period furniture, metal ware, textiles, weaving, pottery, china, prints and articles of historical value in home decorations, to properly carry on the work of the normal and industrial art departments, the committee in charge of the campaign is laboring earnestly for such donations. They have announced that such donations will be housed in a fire-proof building.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—The most worried duchess in Great Britain is the Duchess of Leinster.

All because the Duke of Leinster, her husband, is the most adventurous duke in Great Britain, widely known as the "daredevil duke."

Somewhere in Ireland, in the forces of the Irish Free State, there may be serving this tall, good-looking man of 39, who, if given half a chance, will be sure to do something that is brave to the point of being reckless. For the duke is a new recruit to the armed forces of Michael Collins.

One Among 28

Outside of the royal dukes there are only 28 dukes in the United Kingdom and Leinster is the only present holder of a coronet who adds an spice of romance to the title.

Here is his record.

MONEY—He cared so little for it that in his younger years he was often in the bankruptcy courts.

LOVE AND BEAUTY—He cared so much for it he stormed the heart of the beautiful May Etheridge, London's favorite Gaiety girl, and married her when he was just 21.

ADVENTURE—He liked it so well he bought an estate in Canada and roughed it.

SPORTS—Holding an auto driver's license since he was 15, he has been such a speed merchant that he has often been fined by grave magistrates, although in his whole 15 years of driving he has never had an accident, not even on his recent record-breaking 15-hour drive of 610 miles from London to Aberdeen.

WAR—An officer in a west riding regiment, he served throughout the great 1914-1819 conflict, being badly wounded a number of times and always returning to duty just as soon as he was patched up.

Where Is He?

Just where the duke is now is a puzzle none in London can solve. There were just three pieces of news

in connection with him before he disappeared from his usual metropolitan haunts.

He was fined 5 pounds for fast driving.

He announced he was going to cross the Atlantic ocean single-handed in a 12-ton ketch.

And it was stated he had offered his services to the Irish free state in any capacity in which he could be useful.

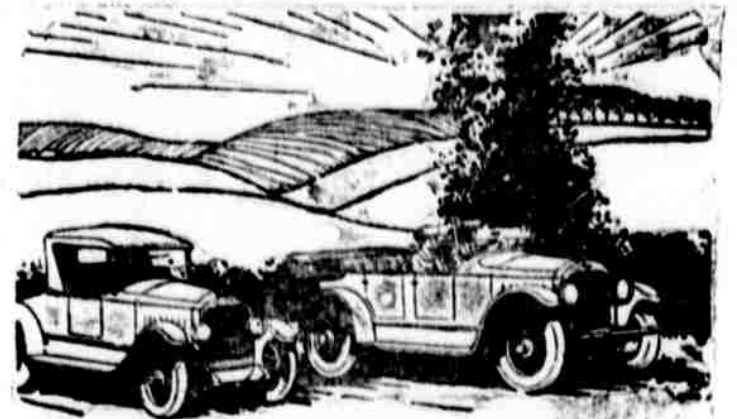
