Klamath Indians picking huckleberries at Huckleberry mountain, unconsciously taking a leaf from Mark Twain, have launched a new sport, according to Clayton Kirk.

Frog jumping, says Kirk, is now in vogue and bids fair to supersede in popularity all other sports. It all started, he said, when one of the Indians found a small frog and wagged another berry picker that he could not find one as small. The challenge was accepted and two-bits changed hands.

From this modest start, the sport developed into long distance jumping. Frogs with lean bodies and long legs are in strong demand. Contests are the rage and huckleberries are forgotten.

At last reports Reginald Schonchin had the champion frog, Kirk said. But Jesse Kirk and others are keen to capture coveted honors and it is not expected that Schonchin's frog will hold the title long.

There are lots of huckleberries but few pickers this year, Kirk said.

Portland Ball Park Has Record Number of Home Runs This Year

PORTLAND, Aug. 26.—Nearly one and one-half home runs to a game—1.4 to be exact—have been knocked out in the Portland park of the Pacific coast baseball league this season. Nothing like it ever has been seen here before, and the average, if kept up all season, will make a total of 141, compared with 87 last year. The 87th homer this year was hit by Brown of Oakland on August 3.

Up to the middle of August, there had been 102 four-baggers in 72 games. Of this number, the Beavers hit 56 and the opposing clubs 45. Jimmy Middleton and Babe Walberg were the principal Portland pitchers to yield over-the-fence smacks, with eight off each, while four visiting pitchers were nipped for four home runs apiece. The greatest sufferer in any one game was Kung of Sacramento, who was hit for four of them in one afternoon, the disaster occurring on Decoration Day.
