### G. A. R. VETERANS TO HOLD 56TH MEET WEEK OF SEPT. 24TH

DES MOINES, Ia., Sept. 8.—The fifty-sixth national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held here during the week beginning September 24.

Aging veterans of '61, their ranks greatly diminished by death, will gather with their comrades for the fifty-sixth time since ending their services in the union armies.

Tales of famous battles, charges at Gettysburg, Sherman's march to the sea, privations and sufferings which ended with the surrender of Lee at Appomattox, will be recalled and told with an enthusiasm which has increased at each annual encampment.

Less than 52,000 of the "boys in blue" are alive today. Their numbers, running into hundreds of thousands shortly after the close of the Civil war, have been thinned with increasing rapidity by the advance of

time. Within a few years the Army of the Potomac will be but a memory. The encampment will open Sunday, September 24, with special services in the Des Moines churches where veterans will be speakers. Monday will be registration day and the time for the exchange of greetings.

Regimental and brigade reunions will be held Tuesday followed by receptions by auxiliary associations at the governor's parlors, in the state house.

The parade will be held Wednesday morning. A school children's program will be given on the grounds of the capitol that afternoon and the great camp fire will be held that evening in the rotunda.

Business of the encampment will occupy the attention of the veterans Thursday morning and afternoon and the election and installation of officers will be held Friday, the last day of the encampment.

### MARRIED BUDDIES TO BE BIG MOGULS AT VET CONVENTION

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 11.—The old slogan "officers only," which is said to have caused more A. E. F. "buck" privates to lose their patience than the entire German army, will have a new peace counterpart at the annual convention of the American Legion to be held here October 16 to 30.

"Married buddies only" will be the new order, word having gone out that only veterans accompanied by their wives will be housed in the residential districts of New Orleans. The remainder of the 150,000 guests expected are to be billeted in buildings, hotels, and other quarters. To comrades who were telling their wives that they could not make the trip to the convention because of "lack of accommodations," the committee has advised that married men accompanied by their wives will be given preference.

Distinguished guests and delegates from the more remote states will be housed in downtown hotels, rooming houses, halls, business buildings and lodge rooms will be utilized to care for the thousands of single vets. Accommodations will be supplied for more than 14,000 in Pullman cars in the three large railroad yards of the city.

The most representative gathering of America's fighting forces in the world war since the signing of the armistice will make up a parade, convention officials say, in which more than 50,000 Legionnaires, marching in the uniforms which they wore in active service, will take up the marching stride on the A. E. F. down the streets of New Orleans, keeping step to more than 100 bands and drum corps.

The veterans will march by states in the order of membership during the last year. State units will be accompanied by bands of the various departments which will participate in the band and drum corps contests.
