FIVE EIGHT TO BEAT LODGE IN MASS. CONVENTION

 Joust, but with a certain jealousy; they bitterly resent the disposition of senators and congressmen and private citizens in other states joining in the lambasting of Lodge. To them Lodge is an institution, a monument, a local deity—senator for thirty years, as prominent as the mouth of the Rock.
 National interest is greater in the Massachusetts fight than in any other political struggle of the year, particularly because Lodge is regarded—in his capacity as chairman of the senate committee on foreign relations and his leadership of the fight against former President Wilson and the league of nations—as the arch-enemy of the democratic party.

Hope for Defeat
 Democrats in Massachusetts and the United States generally are praying for the defeat of Lodge in his sixth senatorial fight. But they are gloomily apprehending no earthquakes, certainly none at the primaries, and probably none in November.

MOTOR TRUCKS IN DEMAND
 Approximately \$250,000,000 will be spent in the United States this year for 250,000 motor trucks of all sizes. The cost for maintenance and upkeep is estimated to be \$750,000,000.

JACKSON COUNTY FAIR
 The Jackson County fair opens at Medford tomorrow and will continue through the week, ending Saturday night. Every effort has been made to make this the biggest fair, other than the State Fairs, of either Oregon or California.

One hundred eighteen acres of land have been purchased and permanent buildings are being erected, many of them being completed for this year's fair. Over \$50,000 is being spent this year, practically all for permanent improvements.

A mile and one-eighth auto race track is completed and there will be auto races each afternoon. Motorcycle polo and motorcycle races are daily features.

The boxing match Thursday night will draw crowds from the more distant cities and the country sections as far east as Lakeview because of the meeting of Bob Brown, once Dempsey's sparring partner, and Gordon McKay, Pacific Coast champion. There will be four preliminaries that evening.

Saturday night the wrestling match between Oscar Butler of Portland and Ralph Iland, well known in Southern Oregon will be the main attraction. Butler has been in 53 matches and lost but one. The wrestlers in this contest are coming contestants for the lightweight championship of the United States.
