WHITMAN ELEVEN FACING HARDEST GAMES OF CAREER

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Sept. 15.—Although the 1922 Whitman eleven faces what is probably the hardest schedule ever attempted by a Whitman college team, prospects for the coming season are generally regarded as being probably the rosier that they have been in a number of years.

Ten letter men from last year's team are eligible for the squad this season. These veterans are Earl Tilton and Harold Shepherd, halfbacks; Maurice Roe, quarterback; Frank Hall and Claude Norris, the colored star, fullback; Captain "Red" Heritage, tackle; "Buz" Schroeder and Hal Holmes, ends; Lucht, center; Hatchford, guard.

Other veterans who are eligible are Harrison, Boyd and Bayes, guards; Dean, end. Three other men who played in some of the games last season but did not make letters will also be back. They are "Shorty" Townsend, Ellis Carr and Art Walther. Walther was forced out last fall by breaking his leg in the first game of the season. He looks like a good prospect for a line berth this year.

In addition to these men, Whitman will probably have a number of likely looking freshmen out who will give the more experienced men a strong run for their positions. A conference ruling makes freshmen eligible to play in schools where the male enrollment does not exceed 200 students. Whitman authorities believe that the number of men students in attendance this fall will come within the conference limit, which would make first-year students eligible for varsity berths.

Coach R. V. "Nig" Borleske will have four weeks to whip his team into shape for the first game of the season, with the University of Idaho. As he will have last year's backfield intact, his principal attention will be devoted toward developing men to fill the vacant line positions. The number of veterans out for line berths does not make this task appear overly difficult. In all

probability one of the excess guards will be moved over to the vacant tackle position.

The teams that Whitman will meet this fall include the University of Idaho, the University of Montana, the University of Nevada, the University of Oregon, the University of Utah, Willamette university and the College of Idaho. This schedule includes a 3000 mile trip on which the universities of Utah and Nevada will be played at Salt Lake City and Reno, respectively.

More eggs have been laid this year than ever before, the department finds. The total is approximately twenty-two billion eggs, an increase of ten percent in production since the war. There has been a decreased consumption in poultry and farmers have been compelled to keep their hens on the farms.
