At the Palo Alto grounds in New York, NEA cameramen snapped all the fast action in the early innings of the opening world series game, Wednesday, rushed by taxi to VanCourtland Park, New York, and placed them aboard a special plane piloted by W. L. Smith, famous "picture snapper" flyer, who had made a landing there by special permission of the New York police.

Taking off at 2:55 p. m., Smith flew the 425 miles to Cleveland in 4 hours, 45 minutes, making one landing at Bellefonte, Ohio.

The last hour and a half of Smith's flight was made in darkness. He was guided to his landing field in Cleveland by flares. From the field the negatives were rushed to NEA headquarters, developed, printed, etched, matted and mailed to all clients Wednesday night.

While Smith was flying westward, NEA's New York office also was working at top speed, making another special mailing of first world series mats to all clients—thus giving double protection.

Incidentally, Smith was one of the aviators who helped NEA Service score its memorable feat in getting first Dempsey-Carpentier knockout pictures to its clients.

Over 600 youngsters, youngsters from Klamath Falls schools were the guests of Manager Poole at the Liberty Theatre yesterday for the showing of "Alice in Hungerland," the Near East film. After seeing thousands of happy youngsters playing in Near East orphanages and realizing that only a constant flow of funds could keep them in the orphanages, the children voted unanimously to enter on a week of acts of money making and saving to help "feed the kids that ain't got nothin'," as one youngster was heard to express it. Relief work will be the key note in many homes and money hither to spent for sport, amuse and for games is to be given for those who starve.
