WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 12.—American anti-vivisection forces have announced the reinforcing of their cause aimed at adoption of laws abolishing the practice. Dr. Walter R. Hayden, head of the British union for the abolition of vivisection, has been engaged and is making a speaking tour of the country opposing vivisection.

sage of an anti-vivisection amendment to the state constitution. Sentiment is strong in California for such a measure, according to officials of anti-vivisection societies, despite the defeat of a similar bill two years ago. After a month's work in California, Dr. Hayden will visit eastern states.

Advocates of the practice who believe in its value to the human race and to the medical sciences, did not discuss the question publicly with him, it was said, when he visited this country several years ago. He is making the present visit in answer to those proponents of vivisection who challenged his right to speak for opponents.

The doctor was formerly a believer in vivisection, it was said, as well as vaccination and inoculation. Dr. Hayden claims that 75 percent of English children are unvaccinated, and attributes to that fact the lowest smallpox rate in the entire history of that country.
