Fraudulent Loans to Relatives and Associates Alleged By Ingalls

How Senator Walter M. Pierce. Democracy's gubernatorial candidate, fraudulently secured loans aggregating thousands of dollars from the state school fund by using relatives and business associates as dummy applicants is made public by Claude E. Ingalls, secretary of the republican state central committee in an article in the Portland Telegram of October 11.

Three relatives-two brothers and sister, and two business associates were used by the senator in securing the loans.

In Pierce's Handwriting

Accompanying the Telegram article is a photographic copy of the application of Charles M. Pierce, brother of the senator, and also of that given to the land board of George W. Tape, business associate of the senator, and the acknowledgement

With the exception of the signaures themselves, the applications are in the handwriting of the senator, and some of the acknowledgements were made before him.

Briefly, here is the story of how the senator used his relatives and business associates to fraudulently obtain tue loans.

Oregon has what is known as the rreducible school fund from which loans are made on farm lands as not to exceed one-third the value of the property, and at an interest rate of-6 per cent.

But under the law no loan in excess of \$5000 can be made to any single individual, and it was to evade this provision of the law that Senator Pierce, who owned thousands of acres of land, used his relatives and business associates as dummy applicants.

Deeds to Dumnies

Deeding his lands to his three relatives and two business associates he body tickets as possible, a contest had them secure the loans and then soif. Most of the deeds reconveying the lands to the senator were executed within a few days after the

> The data gathered from the records by Secretary Ingalls show that on November 16, 1903, the senator deeded a tract of his land to his brother, Charles M. Pierce, for a consderation of \$15,600; that on November 23 of the same year Charles M. Pierce executed a mortgage to the land board for a loan of \$5000, and that on November 30 of the same year Charles M. Plorce reconveyed the land back to the senator for the same consideration as set out in the deed from the senator to his brother.

Deed to Sister Further the data shows:

That on November 16, 1903, the same date as the deed executed to the brother Charles, the senator executed a deed for a tract of land to his sister Minnie B. Pierce for a consideration of \$16,600; that on November 23, 1903, Minnie B. Pierce secured a loan of \$5000 from the school fund and that on December 13, 1903, Minnie B. Plerce reconveyed the land to the senator.

That on November 16, 1903, the senator deeded to his brother, Geo. A. Pierce, a tract of land for a consideration of \$15,600; that on November 23 of the same year the brother secured a loan of \$5000
