THE LIBERTY

The first performance of "The Two Orphans" from which "The Orphans of the Storm" at the Liberty Wednesday and Thursday, is taken, in this country was given in the old Union Square theatre, New York, December 21, 1874.

Throughout the play's life in America, Louise, the blind girl, was looked upon as the principal part. In Mr. Griffith's elaboration for the screen, her elder sister Henriette (played by Lillian Gish) is the chief role.

The marvel of the old "Two Orphans" was the combination by the author of no less than four separate and distinct heart stories; the weaving together of the four strands so that happiness came to each of the groups in the denouement.

"The Two Orphans" opened on December 21 and closed June 15. A run of six months for the one play was something that had been previously unheard of. A. M. Palmer leased the production to Charles A. Stevenson, and later sold him the American rights outright. Opposite Louise, Mr. Stevenson played first the sympathetic role of Pierre, later the romantic one of the Chevallier, and finally when he attained middle-aged portliness, the role of the burly villain Jacques Frochard.
