George Watt, president and manager of the company, has a crew of men at work repairing the dykes and preparing for the fall sowing of grain. One thousand sacks of seed grain have been purchased for the fall and spring planting and by spring, Watt says, the association will have 3000 acres under cultivation, this besides the acreage used for grazing purposes. Sheep will be put on the pasture for fall fattening.
