THEY COME THREE DEEP

The picture above gives an idea of how Pianos and Players are shipped in three rows in harness. This results in saving the cost and freight of the boxes and as today boxes and pianos are sold separately by the manufacturers, it is considerable in saving to ship harnessed.

The Earl Shepherd Co. was one of the first piano dealers to take advantage of these savings and pass it along to the public, but as four to six more instruments can be placed in the car, making the number eighteen to twenty-four, only the comparatively large dealer can make use of this method of shipping.

Another method of shipment is boxed by steamship via the Panama Canal, and in this case the freight by steamer from New York to San Francisco is only approximately one-half of the railroad freight from San Francisco to Klamath Falls—again resulting in a substantial saving.

The Earl Shepherd Co. now has a car en route, in which for each regular piano there are eight Player-pianos, and fuller announcement will be made later.—Adv.
