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### COLLEGES TO PLAY THREE CONFERENCE GAMES THIS SEASON

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—Only three Pacific coast conference football games will be played this year by the Oregon Aggies, California and the University of Southern California as a result of Stanford's recent resignation from the organization.

The three schools have games scheduled with Stanford and all will be played, exactly as scheduled, but they will not count in the table of conference standings.

Washington also plays Stanford but the loss of this contest from its organization list cuts its conference games down to five. Washington state college has six conference games on its schedule, the largest number of any team this year. Oregon and Idaho each have four games.

The first conference game, played last Saturday between Washington and Idaho, was won by the former. Tomorrow Washington goes into another conference game, this time against the Oregon Aggies at Seattle. Washington State and Idaho are scheduled for a conference game today at Moscow.

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One week from tomorrow the conference schedule gets going in full blast, with Oregon playing Idaho at Portland, Washington playing Washington State at Pullman and California meeting Southern California at Los Angeles. On that date Stanford meets the O. A. C. at Corvallis.

### 215-Pound Guard Is Big Asset to Southern California "U." Eleven

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20.—Captain Leo ("Babe") Calland, 215-pound guard of the University of Southern California football team, is one of the eleven's greatest assets, according to Coach Elmer C. ("Gloomy Gus") Henderson.

Babe played center on the squad last fall but was shifted to guard this season. On defense he plays center.

This is Calland's third and last year of varsity football at U. S. C. and his second captaincy and seventh year as a player under Henderson. Calland played under Henderson for the Broadway high school of Seattle and when Henderson was signed as coach for the Trojans, Calland followed as a student.

When Calland finishes his course at U. S. C. he plans to become a football coach at some southern California high school. He says he believes coaching will soon become one of the country's leading professions.

Calland is also a good swimmer and his fellow students say he is a good mixer and a good fellow. High marks in his subjects in university work prove his capability as a student.
