LONDON, Oct. 20.—Britain's wealthy aristocracy is up in arms against the indiscriminate introduction into society of pretty women. A series of mysterious robberies by a band of expert cracksmen, believed to be led by a newswoman in society who is Miss Raffles in disguise, is attracting nation-wide attention.

The latest and biggest haul of jewels beyond monetary price had been made from the castle of the Earl and Countess of Jersey—all in spite of night watchmen, padlocked gates, water-dogs, halted shutters, iron bars, and the latest things in mechanical burglar alarms.

So far in combing the list of pretty women recently ushered into society in an effort to solve the mystery.

For some time one of the professions of the "new poor"—broken-down aristocrats with great lineage but slender purses—has been to introduce the new rich and other strangers into the charmed circle of society, for handsome cash considerations.

One of the persons thus introduced is believed to be the mysterious Miss Raffles.

The Jersey robbery occurred several nights after a great Red Cross fete at Middleton park, the ancestral home near Bicester.

Several mornings later it was discovered that a band of cracksmen had entered the castle in spite of all the precautions to make the place impregnable.

Even the dogs, turned loose in the great hall, were no protection. Candles in great silver candelabra lighted the rooms while the thieves worked, and in the morning were still burning.

The jewel chests were rifled of all the antique and historic rings, medals, bracelets, watches and snuff boxes.
