The territory now served by The California Oregon Power Company includes parts of Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Douglas Counties in Oregon, and Siskiyou County and parts of Shasta and Trinity Counties in California. This is an area equal to the combined areas of the states of Massa-chusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.

During the period between 1912 and 1921, the number of onsumers has grown from 6,561 to 11,900, an increase of 81.3%.

#### Increase in Facilities

The Company owns and operates seven hydro-electric plants in Southern Oregon and Northern California. It has never resorted to generation of electricity by steam power. In building these hydro-electric plants, a natural resource is being developed which will be productive forever.

In 1912, the generating capacity was 11,800 H. P. and at the end of 1922, it will amount to 52,580 H. P.

The Company's high tension lines at the end of 1922 will be over six hundred miles in length.

The aggregate length of the distribution lines will be over eight hundred and ten miles.

The investment needed for the construction of these fa-cilities has increased from \$4,189,325.76 in 1912 to \$9,567,-430.60 on June 30, 1922.
