pledge to observe the following rules:

3. In bed every night by 10:30.
4. No pork, pastry or other rich foods.
5. Milk should not be used in excess.
6. Very little, and, if possible, no water at meals.
7. Drink a lot of water between

meals.

8. If desired, coffee or tea one meal a day.
9. Not too much meat.
10. Absolutely no eating between meals.
11. A quick shower after practice each day, and then go directly home to avoid possibility of exposure.

The men will be expected to live up to the pledge throughout the football season.

Animal Sex Is Changed; Hens Are Made Cockerels

LONDON, Oct. 21.—The day should come, according to eminent British zoologists, when science will be able to determine and to control the power of growth. The interest taken in this subject was shown by the numerous audience which attended a lecture on intersexuality before the British Association by Dr. F. A. K. Chew.

Dr. Chew is the scientist who last year reported the result of some remarkable experiments during which he changed hens into crowing cockerels. The continuation of these experiments, he said, had resulted in the complete reversal of the sex of hens and cockerels. But his lecture this year dealt chiefly with goats.

A case was known to him, he said of a goat which had won prizes when an immature female and which came later to assume male characteristics and in behaviour was a male.

"I believe," he said, that an animal possessing the function of the female can undergo such a complete transformation as to function as a male.

WOMAN PROVES TO BE SUCCESSFUL AT DEEP SEA DIVING

LONDON, Oct. 21.—The profession of deep sea diving, which any one would classify as a calling particularly fitted for men, has been successfully invaded by a woman. Margaret Naylor, an English girl is acclaimed as one of the most efficient and daring wearers of the helmet in British waters.

She has gained a wide reputation during the last two years, and more recently for her efforts in the recovery of treasure from the sunken Spanish galleon lying in ten fathoms of water near the shore of Mull, an island off Scotland. There, in the cozy little harbor of Tobermory, and less than a hundred yards from the beach, lies one of the great treasure ships of the Spanish Armada. The boat was one of the many vessels launched by the ambitious Phillip, in 1588, for his attempted conquest of England.

So certain was this monarch that he would add the British Isles to his already large domains, that he actually sent on his jewelled regalia in advance. It is believed today that the richly jewelled crown is lying somewhere in the 60 feet of water among the wreckage of the Admirante de Florencia, which Miss Naylor has succeeded in negotiating.

Although the task presents many problems which would cause anxiety to divers of the stronger sex, Miss Naylor shows no fear. She had had one or two narrow escapes from death in the course of her experience, without being in any way deterred from tackling the risky business again.

Miss Naylor recently made a trip to the southern coast of England and obtained some excellent specimens of undersea plant life. She nearly lost her life when her feet became entangled in a ladder which she was using, and only her presence of mind enabled her to free herself and be hauled safely to the top.

OLYMPIA TEAM IS PREPARED FOR GAME WITH CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.—Determined to defeat California, the Olympia football team of this city has been practicing day and night for several days in preparation for its clash Saturday with the Golden Bear. California has not lost a game since 1919 but the clubmen are confident they can turn the trick Saturday.

Many college stars of a few years back are on the Olympic team this year and the eleven, which is coached by Bob Evans, former Stanford coach, is in good shape.

"Rabbit" Bradshaw, former Nevada quarterback, and Jack Patrick, Stanford captain last year, are two of the club stars. Two California men, Cort Majors and George Latham, who played with the club in earlier games, will not play against their old team for, it is claimed, they know the California system and some of the California signals.

THE COMPANY

It is non-callable, and if purchased at the present price yields a permanent return of 7.6% on the investment.

It is exempt from Federal Normal Individual Income Tax.

It takes precedence as to assets and dividends over common stock amounting to \$4,441,100 par value. The equity back of the preferred stock now outstanding amounts to a total of \$6,296,605.50 which equals \$283.50 per share or over three times the present cost of \$92 per share.

Purchase may be made in any amount from one share upward.
