SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—Reduction of fire hazards in California mines will be discussed at conference here of mine operators, mine employes and all others interested in mine safety.

Preparation of safety orders will follow the conference. It is expected. The public at large has been invited to attend in person or to mail their recommendations or suggestions in the matter to the commission.

The commission has ordered monthly drills to be held in mines in California where fire hazards exist and all employes must be instructed as to their duties in the event of a mine fire.

Tommy Burns Claims to Have Discovered Another "White Hope"

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Tommy Burns, ex-heavyweight champion, claims to have found a new "white hope" in Robert Reed, a gigantic Irish youth who has lived in Scotland since he was 12 years old.

In a photograph sent to The Daily Mail, the British veteran's find towers above him; Burns head reaches only to Reed's shoulders. Reed has a good appearance, an athletic build, and is gaining flight experience in the rough and tumble life of the English travelling boxing show.

Burns says that he has tried Reed out and that he is not disappointed in him. "Last year Reed won the amateur western district championship in Scotland," said Burns. "He is a quiet, gentlemanly boy, and of course needs a lot of experience. Only time can tell whether he will develop into a real champion. The experience with the travelling boxing show, which he joined after winning the amateur championship, certainly won't do him any harm."

Nevada Governor Is Booster for Highway

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—Ten thousand Nevadans, in other words, one eighth the entire population of the Sagebrush state, come to San Francisco each year and go home "broke," Governor Emmet D. Boyle of Nevada declared here recently at a meeting called to further the cause of the victory transcontinental highway.

Governor Boyle and Governor Charles R. Mabey of Utah have promised to help in the work. The victory highway, it is planned, would cross Utah and Nevada and bring tourists into northern California. Already, it is said, the road is stretching out from the east headed for the west. The road is expected to be completed, but not paved, in two years.

Southern Pacific vs. People of Klamath County

For years the people of Klamath Falls and Klamath County have waited for deliverance from the killing load of domination by a single railroad.

The Supreme Court of the United States, on May 29, 1922, gave us the long-prayed for means of escape by holding the Southern Pacific UNLAWFULLY in exclusive possession of our rail facilities in Klamath, and ordering that our county be thrown open to competitive railroads.

This decision is being resisted by the Southern Pacific, the Lumber and Box Industries of Klamath and the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce.

The report of the Railroad Committee of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce recently made and which was adopted by its Board of Directors, reads:

"We are unanimously of the opinion that it will be to the best interests of the State of Oregon for the Southern Pacific Lines to control the Central Pacific lines north of San Francisco, and we recommend that the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce * * * so inform the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Southern Pacific Company."

So far as the Chamber of Commerce, the Lumber and Box Industries and the Southern Pacific can accomplish it, the people of Klamath are sold into slavery to the Southern Pacific.

Will you people of Klamath submit to have these three, with their referendum of 60 votes, decide the fate of 20,000 people, who have as much right to a place in the sun as has the Lumber and Box Industry? IT IS UP TO THE PEOPLE TO DECIDE!

Come to the Mass Meeting at Scandinavian Hall, Friday evening, October 27, at 8 o'clock, and hear full discussion, and then vote your own will in this matter.
