Southern Universities Will Stage Annual Grid Battle Tomorrow

FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—In the form of the University of California football team, led by the most powerful ever propped up by the big Berkeley school, the University of Southern California tomorrow will meet the University of California in a grid battle at Pasadena.

The game will be the first of the season and is expected to be a close one. The California team, composed of college stars who had fought together, would stop the advance of the Golden Bears, who took a 10-0 lead in the first quarter but California held the "hot game" by 10-0 in the second quarter.

Baby Bonus Is Abolished

SYDNEY, N. Y., Oct. 27.—The abolition of the baby bonus, a federal baby bonus to mothers, to which legislation is said to have been introduced in the House, has been given by the federal treasury, who is considering whether the sum of \$100,000,000 or \$200,000,000 should be paid annually in maternity allowances. It is expected that the maternity allowance will be granted during July. The number of claims was 1,000,000 as compared with 1,000,000 during July, 1921, and 1,124 during July, 1920.

Supreme Court of May 29, 1922, ordering the Southern Pacific Company to surrender its exclusive control of the Central Pacific, or shall Klamath Falls remain indefinitely under the sole control of the Southern Pacific, as at present.

This is the most vital question ever faced by the people of Klamath County, and IT MUST BE SOLVED NOW.

Every family that feels the pinch of the high cost of living should be represented tonight. Every merchant whose receipts largely go to pay abnormal freight rates; every farmer and stockman who is discriminated against and cannot ship his product or reap any benefit from the labor of his hands, is vitally interested, BECAUSE UNJUST AND CRUSHING FREIGHT RATES (the direct result of the uncontrolled domination of one single railroad—the Southern Pacific), is at the root of all the trouble.

Klamath County must be bound by the recommendation of a bout 60 members of the Chamber of Commerce approving one railroad control, or it must PROTEST VIGOROUSLY TO THE INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION AT ONCE.
