

**SALEM BACK YARDS  
GROW WALNUTS TO  
SUPPLY WHOLE CITY**

**LONDON, Nov. 1.—**Sufficient walnuts to supply every man, woman and child in Salem with two and a half pounds have been grown in the parking spaces and yards within the city limits, a survey of Salem reveals.

Approximately 48,000 pounds of nuts were grown on the city's shade trees this year. It is estimated that this is more than enough to supply the entire needs of the city for the coming year. The crop is valued at \$12,000.

Local authorities believe that there are enough trees growing in Salem parking spaces to plant an orchard of 60 acres. There are believed to be over 1,000 trees within the city limits.

In order to determine which varieties of walnuts will do the best locally, many of the growers have been doing considerable experimental work. One grower has a dozen different varieties growing on one tree.

**LONDON, Nov. 1.—**The fact that the Prince of Wales is collecting pearls for a necklace has furnished another topic of absorbing interest for discussion over the tea cups, and there are flutters in the hearts of those interested in the royal matrimonial plans.

It will be remembered that Lord Lascelles did exactly the same thing before the announcement of his engagement to Princess Mary. But even with that precedent, it is not safe to assume that any exciting news will follow the revelation of the prince's intentions in such matters, for pearl collecting among the English nobility is a time honored occupation.

Many priceless collections of pearls have been owned by Englishmen in the past, but very few of them are intact at the present time. The Duchess of Devonshire still possesses the famous Devonshire pearls which were collected 50 years ago at a cost said to have been 50,000 pounds.

The Duke of Buckingham, during the reign of Charles I, was able to collect the most famous pearls then in England but at the time of the Commonwealth they were taken to Paris and sold to various dealers there.

Matching pearls in the present day is a hard task and, of course, it requires a very long and well filled purse. Even when money is no object it requires much time and infinite patience. All the markets of the world must search, and each pearl must be considered in relation to all the others to form a perfect necklace.

Friends of Miss Jeanette Howard will be glad to hear that she has recovered from her operation and has returned to her home at Bly.


The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Earn Guyne was very ill the latter part of the week with a severe cold.
