PROTESTANT FORCES FIGHT SCHOOL BILL

Organization Formed to State Opposing Side to Voters of Oregon.

Opposition on the part of various Protestant denominations to the proposed compulsory education bill, so-called, is being carried on through an organization formed in Portland, with headquarters in the Consolidated Security building. Its purpose is to state to the voters of Oregon the objections of those whom it represents to the passage of the measure.

W. L. Brewster, former city commissioner of Portland, member of the public library board and lawyer of prominence, is chairman. Joseph A. Hill, principal of Hill Military academy, Portland, a nonsectarian school for boys, is executive secretary. Members representing various Protestant interests include Richard W. Montague, James Stapleton, Frederick Strong, H. G. Thurston, F. W. J. Sylvester, W. J. Henderson and Mahol Holmes Parsons.

A statement just issued through this office says, briefly:

The proposed bill is fundamentally un-American, as it undertakes to deprive certain people of the right to send their children to schools where religion is a part of the training.

It would close all private schools of whatever denomination or nonsectarian institutions, such as the Hill Military academy.

It is unnecessary; upsets the theory of our government; fosters intolerance, bigotry and invites religious controversy.

Its provisions would place on taxpayers of Oregon more than \$1,000,000 additional taxes to care for the several thousand pupils now in the various private schools of the state; new buildings would be required and a large added teaching staff.

It would confiscate needlessly millions of dollars worth of private property now devoted to private school work and disorganize a force of trained teachers, throwing them out of employment.

Above all, it is unconstitutional, and looks back to witchcraft days when burning at the stake was the fate of many who believed differently than others and dared to exercise their rights. It is inconceivable that the voters of generous Oregon will put the brand of religious bigotry and intolerance upon this fair state.

PROMINENT PORTLAND EDUCATOR IS HONORED

At a recent meeting of representatives of several nonsectarian and Protestant private schools held in Portland, Joseph A. Hill, president of Hill Military Academy, was elected executive secretary of a permanent organization formed on that occasion. Mr. Hill, in addressing the delegates, said: "Our private schools are endangered by the measure known as the 'compulsory educational bill,' which will come before the voters this November. We have given our best thought and effort and years of untiring devotion to the cause of education and now all our work would be swept away in the flood that is directed at the private schools.

"Oregon already has a compulsory educational law. Why should this new measure be necessary? Private schools such as the Hill Military academy and others on the list of those to be affected use practically the same books and courses of study as do public schools. But we have smaller classes and can give more individual attention to the pupils. To do away with our schools would be to increase the taxpayers' burdens materially for it would take millions of dollars to build extra public schools, equip them and provide them with teachers. In addition it would destroy the means of living of hundreds of our teachers and employes. We teach Americanism first, loyalty and our patriotic exercises daily inspire our pupils with pride in their country and a respect for authority."
