

Statue Will be Unveiled in San Francisco on Armistice Day

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2 - On Armistice Day, Nevember 11, a heroic statue of General Pershing, picturing him as if watching troops in battle, will be unveiled in the Golden Gate park here.

The statue is a gift to the city of San Francisco by Dr. Morris Herzstein, a local physician. It was done by an old friend of the doctor, Haig Patigan, noted San Francisco sculptor.

Eight feet in height, the figure is of gift bronze and stands on a pedastal of silver granite. The pedestal is five feet high. It presents the general is field uniform, standing equarely and looking forward, both face and figure animated with the expression of alertness and energy.

On the face of the pedestal is the inscription. In tribute to General Pershing and the victorious armies of the United States and her co-belligerents during the world war, 1914-1918. Presented by Dr. Morris Herzstein, 1922.

Dr. Herzstein conceived the idea of the statue after he had heard from General Pershing himself the story of the American expeditionary force and saw with his own even the fields where that force had won imperishable glory. The doctor toured the battle fields with Representative Julius Kah nof San Francisco immediately after the armistice and spent some time as the guest of General Pershing.

Patigan has worked on the statue for more than two years, and, at the request of the doctor, has kept the plans a secret.

"I. That the influence of the Portland chamber of commerce be exerted to maintain the independence of the Fentral Pacific in the grouping to be made by the interstale Commerce commission or the lower court, whichever is to have the jurisdiction, as we believe that such an independent line will be for the heat interests of the state of Oregon. We feel that with such an independent and competing line entering the state, traffic arrangements can be had that will insure the completition of the Ontario Crane line of the Union Pacific as well as connect up the Klamath and southerstern portions of the state, including an extension south from Band, in

such a manner as to aid materilaly in their long retarded development. With the northern fineoperating the Oregon Electric service to Eugene at the present
time, and independent Central inrithe from Ogden to Eugene,
there are opened up personalities
of future development and nompetition in both eastern Oregon
and the Willamette valley

"2. That the influence of the chamber of commerce also be excred to the end that the main
line of the Southern Pacific north
and south, i. c., San Francisco
to Portland, should be continued
as a unit and such disposition of
those properties of the Central
Pacific in northern California be
had as to insure this condition.
