COUNTY FAIR BOARD UPHOLDS FAIR SITE PURCHASE

The county fair board has endorsed the purchase of a permanent fair site, because we appreciate the importance and value of the fair to the community. The increase in exhibits offered and the general interest displayed in the fair has made it necessary to enlarge the facilities for the care and housing until the limit has been reached in the matter of providing temporary accommodations.

The cost of temporary buildings and grounds the two years previous to 1922 have approximated \$2,000 for each fair. All of this has been a loss to the community insofar as the permanent development of the fair is concerned, besides having been inadequate and unsuitable for the proper display of the exhibits.

The larger part of the cost of putting on the fairs in the past has been met by subscriptions and donations made by the business interests of the county, the premiums and prizes being paid out of the fair fund raised by state and county taxes.

The fair this year was held on the Altamont grounds through the courtesy of the fair and rodeo association, the fair receiving the use of the grounds and buildings rent free, with a provision that if the county voted to purchase the grounds that the fair should receive 20 per cent of the gate receipts, which amounted to \$1500 as the share for the fair. The fair board has expended no money on the improvements of the Altamont tract; neither has it entered into any contract to use the grounds for fair purposes.

The fair board desires that the public and patrons of the fair should

know that it would not have been possible for the board to have provided the exhibit pavilion and stock sheds for less than \$3500 or \$4000, which sum it would have been impossible to have raised for temporary construction. The purpose of a fair is educational, and its value lies in the variety and quality of exhibits, demonstrating the resources and potential value of the county. The interests of the town and country are mutual in this respect; therefore, the cost should be equitably shared.
