both there are strong groups preparing to fight for the overturning of the long-established senatorial rule by which members of long service, regardless of their contributions are automatically promoted to senior citizenship and placed in the line of succession. The rate has been under fire for many years. Veteran leaders freely admit that the present rule is a weak one, but they are not ready to give up a sure, workable substitute. In each new election the majority rule is established and reinforced, but still remains in force. Whether it is to continue another century remains to be seen. It has been modified in some respects, bringing new blood in conferences and other meetings, but its principal features still are binding.

Another effort to break down the old senatorial rule is promised. Citizens advocates plan to press a new rule cutting senatorial tenure from an hour or two on a bill. The senate republican conference has reported such a rule favorably, but there remains strong opposition to any amendment of the unlimited debate privilege.

"The charges of unprofessional conduct published against me are absolutely false. The railroad proposition was initiated by the people of Klamath Falls and adopted by a vote of about 12 to 1. The power company was represented, during my term as City Attorney, by the late C. J. Ferguson. While City Attorney I was faithful to my trust in the last detail, and I challenge any responsible citizen to assert to the contrary. If time for publication permitted, I could offer no better defense than to reprint a column article of appreciation by the people of Klamath Falls, published in The Herald at the time I retired from office. I served under three different mayors by their appointment; about four years have elapsed since my term of service; I have been a candidate for office for about six months, yet with all this opportunity for criticism, there has not been raised the slightest suggestion of improper conduct. The letter signed by Moore was not written, nor its publication paid for by him. The letter is anything but "fair". It seeks at the last minute, by vicious and cowardly means, to defame my character and mislead the public. The people of Klamath County have heretofore been prompt to condemn such methods, and I believe that the people's sense of decency and fairness will condemn this attempt. I have thrown no "mud"; I do not want the office by such tactics."
