WILSON IS ELECTED

BOTH PARTIES WIN AND LOSE IN ALL STATES

Democratic Candidate for Governor Wins in N. Y. G. O. P. Holds Power

BOSTON, Nov. 8.—Senator Lodge was re-elected over Gaston, democrat, yesterday by a plurality of 1,845, a record will undoubtedly be asked by Gaston, his associates said.

DETROIT, Nov. 8.—Former Governor Ferris, democrat, has apparently been elected to the senate to succeed Senator Townsend. Ferris' lead is over 15,000.

OMAHA, Nov. 8.—Howell, republican, for senator and Bryan, for democrat, for governor are elected. The congressional districts are in doubt with the democrats leading three and two in doubt.

DALLAS, Nov. 8.—Mayfield, democrat, overwhelmingly defeated Peedy, republican, and the Independent-democrat candidates for the senate. Mayfield will be the youngest member of the senate.

SEATTLE, Nov. 8.—C. G. Dill was leading Senator Poindexter by 2,000 votes in King county, Washington, and by 500 votes in Spokane this morning.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 8.—For governor of Pennsylvania, 1,100 out of the 8,300 state precincts give Finchet 97,300 and McSparran, democrat 54,250.

RICHARDSON IS ELECTED, CALIF. JOHNSON LEADS

Republican Candidate for Governor Has Majority of Over 30,000

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—Richardson is leading Woolwine by 30,000. Johnson far in lead.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 8.—Friend W. Richardson's election was generally conceded when returns from 83 Los Angeles precincts gave Richardson 14,399 against Woolwine's 7,800. Los Angeles is the democratic candidate's home county. He is the present district attorney. Partial returns from 158 scattered California precincts give Richardson 7,000, Woolwine 4,200.

Senator Hiram Johnson has a two to one lead on Pearson. Seven republican and two democratic congressmen are conceded elected.

WILSON'S STATEMENT

Arthur E. Wilson, mayor-elect, today declared that his administration would be "safe, sane and business-like."
"No one need fear," he said, "the introduction of any Sunday closing ordinances or other such sumptuary legislation. There never was any basis for such apprehension, if it existed."
"I am grateful for the confidence of those who elected me, and have no hidden grudges, for those who supported other candidates. I want to serve the best interests of all the citizens of Klamath Falls, and I hope to have their full co-operation when I undertake the task."
