

# FAMED ARTISTS AT PINE TREE

### Thurlow Lieurance Players First of National Reputation at Playhouse

The concert to be given at the Pine Tree theatre tonight by Thurlow Lieurance and his associates is the first performance of national reputation to be given in that house and it is hoped that the appreciation shown by Klamath Falls people will encourage and justify the management in their desire to furnish this community with what it needs in high class attractions.

Thurlow Lieurance with his Indian songs and his own remarkable compositions based on Indian themes created a sensation among music lovers in the east, who long ago had accepted the dictum as applied to music that there was nothing new under the sun; that the field of national and folk music has been explored and that hereafter nothing could be expected but refinement upon those themes.

Thurlow Lieurance has brought to the world and added to its wealth of musical knowledge an entirely new element and from an unsuspected source. How these wild, simple, aboriginal themes will affect the music of tomorrow may only be guessed but that the influence will be lasting is certain. Our music like our language was brought overseas. We have thought and sung the emotions of alien peoples. But Indian music as found by Thurlow Lieurance, is a wild, beautiful flower sprung from the soil of North America. It is found nowhere else. It is the real American music. Mr. Lieurance's beautiful "By the Waters of Minnetonka" was first sung to a Klamath Falls audience in 1917 and has since been a favorite number. Tonight Klamath Falls people will have the opportunity of becoming acquainted with other songs by the same composer and what is most unusual, presented by the composer himself.
