 lum of some public schools in Cali-
 fornia. The state board of educa-
 tion has granted Miss Blanche Adel-
 is Hawkins, a senior at the Univer-
 sity of California here, a certificate
 authorizing her to "conduct the art
 and process of whistling" in the
 schools.
 Authorities say that this is the
 first time in the history of educa-
 tion that such a certificate has been
 granted.
 "I have always felt," Miss Haw-
 kins said, "that whistling could be
 made a real musical accomplish-
 ment, and the best time to begin
 instructions in whistling, as every
 other study, is in childhood."
