YOUNG AMERICAN BOY GETS RELEASE FROM RUSSIAN ARMY

MOSCOW, Nov. 24.—Henry P. DuBelle, Jr., of New Orleans, La., 20 years old, who was conscripted into the Russian navy in 1919 because he could not show papers proving non-Russian citizenship, has been permitted to leave Russia upon representations made by the American relief administration.

When DuBelle eventually found his identification papers, he managed to get a statement from Soviet authorities acknowledging his American citizenship, but the naval commanders at first refused to recognize these as entitling him to release from naval duty. The intervention of the American relief administration then was successful. DuBelle has gone to Paris, to join his father.

(O. A. C. Experiment Station)

Silage reduces the amount of hay required in feeding rations by one-third. Results show that two pounds of silage is equal to one pound of hay in feeding value. Two tons of silage can be put into the silo cheaper generally than one ton of hay can be put into the stack. The Union experiment station has showed that a combination of hay and silage produced in three year trials twice the gains at half the cost of gains on hay alone.

Straw instead of being burned should be saved and more of it used around the barn during the winter months. The straw not only contains plant food but also prevents the loss of liquid manure. This liquid manure contains a large portion of plant food material.

Ground limestone is best applied now previous to seeding the grain crop in order that the following clover crop secure the benefit. The lime is disked in after plowing the soil.

The base date for show pigs is March 1. In order to have pigs come at that time it is necessary to breed sows the fore part of November.

Silage for stock is a form of succulence and not a balanced ration within itself. In feeding it, roughage such as alfalfa or clover hay should be used or some other good nitrogenous feed supplied. When properly combined with other feeds silage is the means of promoting the health of the animal.

Poultry litter should be watched carefully at this time of the year and changed as often as it becomes damp and heavy. It has a tendency to hold moisture which soon makes the poultry house very damp. A damp poultry house always invites disease.

Where lights are used, now is the time to start them on the pullets. Lights are used for layers only—not for breeders. Artificial light sufficient to make a 12 hour day is generally used.

If a bird is worth treating for disease it is before she is half dead. Prevention rather than cure, first, last, and always.
