Languidly the young man looked up and in a tone of infinite longing, replied:

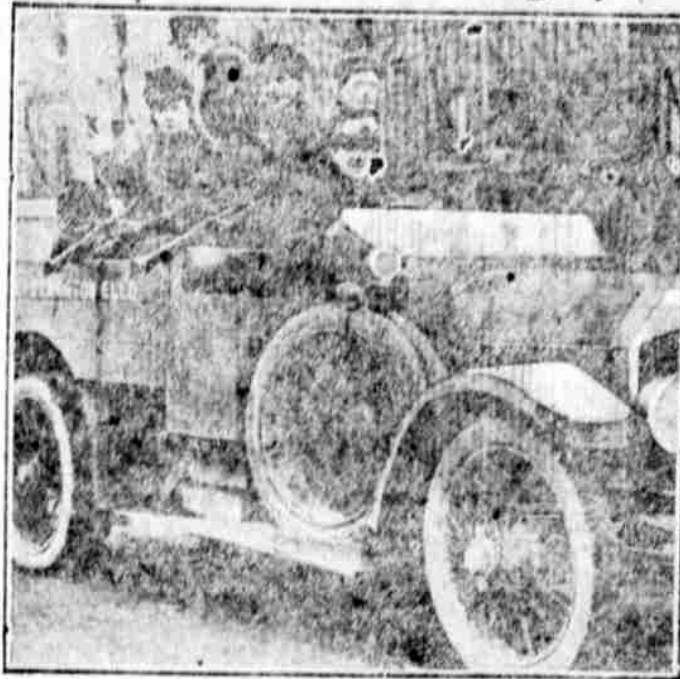
"No, Rio Janeiro."

HERBERT HOOVER IS HONORED BY BELGIUM WITH BRONZE STATUE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, CALIF., Dec. 4.—Belgium, through an official representative locally domiciled here today a bronze statue set up on the Stanford university campus in recognition of the humanitarian services rendered to the Belgian nation during the world war by Secretary Herbert Hoover, a Stanford graduate. The gift was purchased through small contributions from the Belgian people, including children.

The statue, the work of a Belgian sculptor, represents the Egyptian goddess Isis, who typified the spirit of motherhood, the growing grain and the benignant forces of humanity eternally in conflict with evil. The goddess, of more than life size, is pictured seated on a throne, with her features partly concealed by a veil.

Formal presentation was made by Senator Albert LeBeau of Belgium, who was designated by his government and came from his native land for this purpose. Frank Derring, San Francisco, a member of the university board of trustees, formally accepted the gift. Dr. Roy Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford and others, made addresses.

The dedication ceremonies were held in the Stanford chapel, famous for its gorgeous mosaics. Much of the chapel being a Belgian flag carried by Stanford men who saw service in Belgium during the war. The college also sang the Belgian national anthem and America.

The statue has been placed temporarily in the Stanford Art Gallery pending the erection of the war memorial building, where it will be permanently located.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Tests conducted by the department of agriculture to determine justification for the price discount applied to soft and oily hogs as compared to firm hogs, indicates, in the judgment of experts, that the discount is due to the lack of attractiveness of the pork rather than because of any great shrinkage in weight.

Twelve different tests, involving 500 hogs, were made and complete shrinkage records of slaughtering, chilling, curing, smoking and retaining were obtained. The tests showed that the total loss in weight from the cooler to the end of the retaining period of oily pork was 13.85 per cent of the chilled weight and was the same as that of firm pork. The shrinkage in soft pork was nearly 15 per cent, or 2.07 per cent more than that of either the firm or oily pork.

There seemed to be no difference in the flavor or keeping qualities of the three grades, the department announced.

TEACHERS' ANNUAL CONVENTION WILL ATTRACT MANY

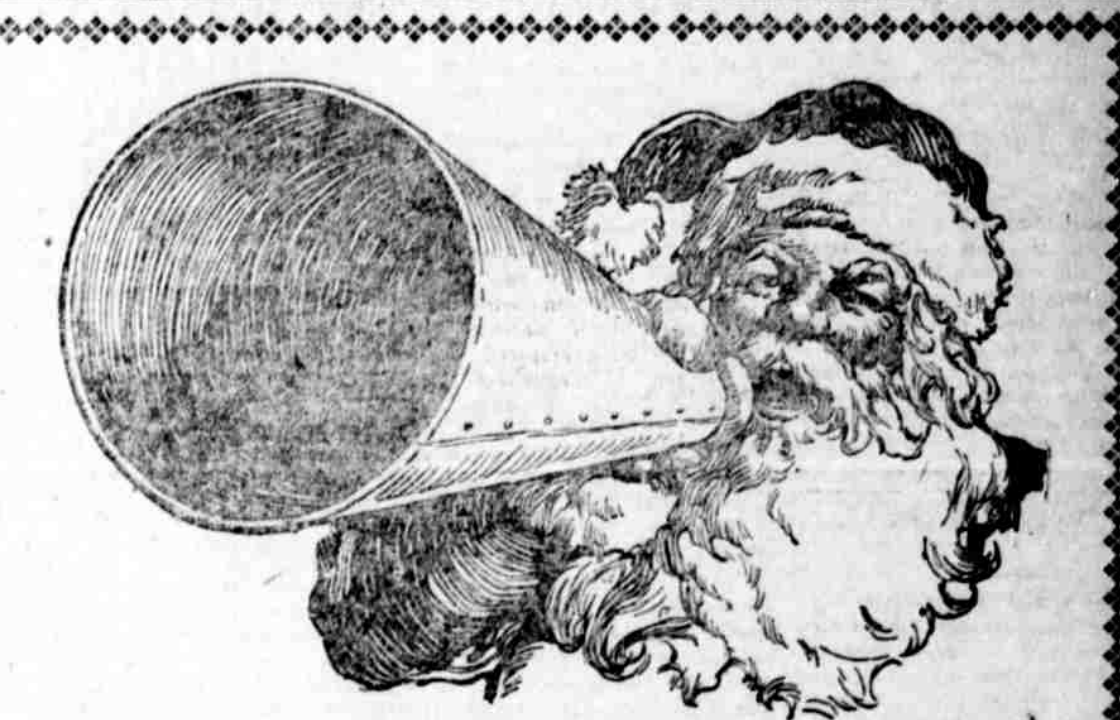
