CONCERT BY STUDENTS

High School Quartette Will Raise Funds to Attend Convention

A concert will be given at the Pine Tree theatre on Thursday evening, December 14, and Monday afternoon, December 17, by the music department of the high school, assisted by local talent, for the purpose of raising funds to send the four boys composing the high school quartette and their instructor, Miss Evelyn Applegate, to the state teachers' convention, which will be held in Portland December 26, 27, and 28. The concert will follow the usual pictures and will be different for both performances.

Miss Evelyn Applegate has been asked by Robert Walsh, director of music in Franklin high school at Portland and in charge of the music for the state teachers association, to give a talk on "the boys voice and its possibilities in high school." The quartette composed of Clifford Hogue, Delos Mills, Harry Peltz, and Kenneth Maier, will accompany her to Portland and give selections at the convention to illustrate Miss Applegate's talk.

Since the talk by Miss Evelyn Applegate will be the only one of this type given at the convention and the songs furnished by the boys will be the only music given outside that of Portland schools, it is considered a high honor for the boys, their instructor and the high school.

Miss Evelyn Applegate, who has worked especially with boys' voices in her wide range of experience in grammar and high schools in different localities, says that it is unusual to have a good boys' quartette in a high school because of the difficulty of having a first tenor

and a second bass to give range to their music.

At the concerts here the boys will give some of the selections which they will sing at the convention, and the public is promised a pleasant surprise by those who have heard the boys sing.

EDUCATION WEEK ON

Nation-Wide Campaign Continues to December 9

American Education Week, for the purpose of promoting good citizenship, and to urge parents to visit the schools, started December 2 and will last until December 9. This is the second annual celebration of the week, which is an idea growing out of plans of the American Legion for the development of good citizenship and the Americanization of foreigners who have come here to live. Programs are to be held in all the schools of the United States every day of Education Week.

An outline of topics for each day has been supplied the principals of all Klamath Falls schools and they have been left to provide speakers for the week. In some cases, as for example the Pelican Bay school, the pupils themselves will have charge of each day's program, due to the difficulty in getting speakers who are willing to go so far and give so much time to the occasion.

Following is the outline of topics beginning with Monday: American Citizenship Day, Patriotism Day, School and Teacher Day, Illiteracy Day, Equality of Opportunity and Physical Education Day.

The Rev. Arthur Rice delivered an address to the upper grade students of the Central school Tuesday, Patriotism Day, and today Mrs. Twyla Ferguson spoke to these same grades at Central. Friday Horace Manning will be the speaker of the day. Other city schools had not arranged their programs fully and were unable to give the names of their speakers for the week.
