

# CHURCH WOMEN IN FUND DRIVE

**\$3,000,000 For Colleges In Far East Sought In Nation-Wide Campaign**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Forgetting denominational lines, church women of America are making an effort to complete by January 1 a \$3,000,000 fund for the seven union colleges for education of women in the Far East. They already have obtained \$1,000,000 toward the fund and the Laura Spelman Rockefeller memorial fund has promised another million if the fund is completed by the first of the year.

The churchwomen have organized a country-wide dollar day, to be held next Saturday. Women irrespective of their religious affiliations, will be asked to give one dollar each towards the education of leaders for the 400,000,000 women of Asia.

Mrs. Henry W. Peabody of Boston is chairman of the committee which has organized 150,000 auxiliaries of all denominations in practically every large city and in every state.

Mrs. Harding was one of the first contributors to the fund, which has the endorsement of the president and Secretary of State Hughes, not only for their work on behalf of Christian education, but also because of their bearing upon international friendship.

The seven Union Christian colleges for women are located in either the capitals or leading cities of the Far East. Two of them are medical schools for training Oriental women as physicians. They are maintained by ten denominational bodies of this country. In one instance, missionary boards of Great Britain also are cooperating. The aim of the schools is to prepare future Christian leaders of the east.

## STANDARD OIL CO ON "WILDCAT" OIL VENTURE IN ALASKA

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7.—On a "wildcat" oil venture in Alaska, the Standard Oil Co. of California has sent an expedition across two ranges of mountains and miles of tundra lands to its property on the southwestern Alaska peninsula where a well is to be drilled.

Men from the company's California fields made up the crew which was sent to Alaska in August. The expedition landed at Portage Bay and occupied 17 days in unloading its equipment by lighters from the steamer. In the outfit was everything necessary to drill a well 4000-feet deep. It included an 84-foot rig, casing, tools, commissary supplies, dynamo, a wireless outfit and two 60-horsepower tractors. Once ashore the crew had to build 17 miles of road. A member of the crew who recently returned to San Francisco said that the road had been built and the lumber for the rig had been laid on the location where the well is to be drilled.

Approximately \$250,000 is to be spent by the company in its first Alaska well. Perhaps more than one well will be necessary before it can be determined that oil is or is not present in commercial quantities.

## ORIGIN OF 'SAY IT WITH FLOWERS' TOLD BY ADVERTISING MAN

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 7.—The story of the slogan "Say it with flowers,"—the circumstances which prompted its coinage, how it came into existence, and its subsequent spread throughout the country, is told by P. P. O'Keefe, its originator, head of a local advertising agency. O'Keefe suggested the slogan to the publicity committee of the society of American florists in Cleveland, December, 1917.

"It was evident that a slogan so worded as to induce people to use flowers more generally—to buy more flowers—was needed," says O'Keefe, describing the birth of the slogan, which recently was claimed by another. "In a great mass of quotations which I gathered from the rhapsodic utterances of poets, working under the impetus of spring fever, I came across this:

"Flowers are words, which even a babe may understand."

From Bishop Cox's—"The Singing of Birds."

"There", I said "is the germ of a slogan. There is a language of flowers. They do speak. Even a babe can understand. Now to work that into a 20th century phrase that conveys the meaning that flowers do have a language!"
