

DARWIN THEORY IS ALL WRONG, ASSERTS SWEDISH MINISTER

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 8.—A declaration that Darwin's theory of evolution is wrong comes from the Rev. Dr. J. Enander, a Swedish country minister, more famous as a botanist, who has just returned to his congregation and an orchard of at least a thousand varieties of willows and willow hybrids, after a botanical tour through the United States and Canada.

When the male plant finds the migration too hard and gives up, the female willow accepts fertilization from some male of a kindred species, and thus cross-breeds arise. Dr. Enander added that there were more than 70 varieties of willows, or willows, and many thousands of cross-breeds.
