GRAVITATION CAUSE IS FOUND

Discoverer Holds Solution Lies In Invisible Ether Waves

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12.—Discovery of the cause of gravitation—something that Sir Isaac Newton, discoverer of the law of gravitation could not find—has been made by an American naval officer, Captain T. J. See, government astronomer at the Mare Island navy yard, near here. Captain See announced his discovery in a lecture before the California Academy of Sciences here today.

Discovery of Captain See of the cause of magnetism, which was also announced in the lecture, led to the finding of a definite connection between magnetism and gravity. Both, he said, are due to invisible ether waves traveling across the heavenly spaces with the speed of light.

For forty years Captain See has been doing research work in magnetism and gravity. He has completed this work, chiefly, since 1914.

The astronomer said his theory is a distinct development on Newton's law of gravitation. Magnetism, he explained, is a million times more powerful than the corresponding force of gravitation.

Captain See demonstrated during his address that a small magnet, when suspended by a thread near a larger one, is pulled bodily toward the nearest pole of the larger magnet. Yet, he showed, that while the nearer pole has the greater power, the remoter pole of the large magnet actually pulls back on the opposite end of a magnetic needle suspended by a thread about its center. The result is to make the lines of force tension lines, stretched like taut ropes.

At the equator, therefore, the two poles of the earth's magnetism being equally distant, attract equally in opposite directions. But at the poles the needle stands on end and is pulled downward bodily by the magnetic force.

By an extension of the theory of the earth's magnetism by Gauss, celebrated German mathematician, in 1838, Captain See draws two conclusions:

1. That magnetism is due to waves, the rotatory motion of the ether particles being about the lines of force, which is also confirmed by Faraday's experiment of the magnetic rotation of a beam of polarized light, 1845.

2. As magnetism is connected with gravitation by See's mathematical law of 1922, it follows that gravitation also is due to waves like those of magnetism.

MORE SURPLUS LABOR SHOWN

Termination of Agriculture Activities Brings Some Unemployment

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12.—The surplus of unskilled workers throughout the Pacific coast increased materially in November, due largely to termination of agricultural activities. J. A. Kelly, San Francisco, district director of the employment division, United States department of labor, declared in his monthly report issued here today.

Building and lumbering are still going forward, however, where weather permits, and a slight improvement in railroad repairs is noted.

An abstract of Kelly's survey of conditions in California, Oregon and Washington follows:

California—Agricultural work and fruit canning practically closed, resulting in a surplus of unskilled labor throughout the state. Citrus fruit picking about to begin, but labor for this can be obtained in local labor market. Lumber is very active and a shortage of experienced help is reported. Wherever the weather permits, the mills and camps will operate during the winter. Building continues to boom, especially in the larger cities. There is a strong demand for all kinds of building trades mechanics especially plasterers and bricklayers. Employ-

ment in oil fields shows no improvement over last month, the San Joaquin and coast fields operating at about one-third capacity, and the southern fields at normal. Railroad repairs reported approaching normal and an increase expected within thirty days. Iron and steel is yet far below normal. Shipyards are engaged in repair work only. Although the approaching winter is bringing the usual influx which adds to the number of unemployed, there is no serious employment problem anticipated this winter.

Oregon—Seasonal employment in fishing and fruit industries has terminated. Lumber and logging continues normal. Building, highway and other construction is slackening. Unemployment is noted principally in larger centers and probably will increase during the next thirty days. Business in smaller communities continues about normal.

Washington—Lack of transportation facilities contributes greatly toward bringing conditions below normal. Real injury is experienced in the fruit districts, while lumber industry has slackened, or in some instances, closed. Approaching winter also terminates many activities.

Unemployment among unskilled is increasing. Skilled woodmen and lumbermen are in less demand. Some new and enlarged enterprises assist to some extent in keeping down the number of idle. Steel mills active.

Kirk Caught In Toils But Remembers Friends

Clayton Kirk, prominent Klamath Indian, who had the misfortune to run afoul of the federal law by supplying two comely young squaws with a bottle of moonshine, appeared

before Judge Bean this morning in Portland, if things went off according to schedule.

Early last week, according to The Oregonian, Kirk, proposing to make his misfortune a Klamath holiday, demanded the right to bring at the government's expense 13 fellow tribesmen from the vicinity of Chilquin to Portland. He wanted them as witnesses in his behalf, it was explained to the court. But Assistant Federal Attorney Baldwin offered violent objection. Round trip fares and witness fees for the 13 would amount bankrupt the government, he asserted. The witnesses were accordingly cut down to seven.

Federal officials maintain that Indians caught in the net of the law are always willing to provide their fellow tribesmen and women with a trip to Portland; that, in fact, it is a grave breach of etiquette not to do so.

COLD WEATHER HOLDS

Temperatures Throughout State Remain Low; Middle West Hot

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—The lowest temperature here this morning was 19 above, at Eugene 22, at Salem 20, at Umatilla 3 above and at Baker 2 below. The forecast is slightly colder tonight.
