Law Would Check

Hasty Marriages

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Dec. 13.—Raising the standard of marriage and automatically decreasing divorce, are the aims of the welfare and marriage law proposed by M. E. Pearson, superintendent of Kansas city schools.

Church workers and club women of Kansas have been appealed to by Pearson to help bring about the passage of the new law at the next session of the Kansas legislature in March.

Pearson proposes to make it mandatory for the names of all persons planning marriage to be published ten consecutive days in a daily newspaper. This, he believes,

NOTED ARTIST TO PAINT PRESIDENT

LONDON, Dec. 14.—Americans will at an early date have the opportunity of welcoming a distinguished British artist in the person of Margaret Lindsay Williams, who will shortly proceed to Washington for the purpose of painting a portrait of President Harding. Sittings have been arranged for next January.

Daughter of a South Wales shipbroker, Miss Williams has had a phenomenally successful career, and by general consent, she now figures in the front rank of living British portrait painters.

Miss Williams first studied art at the Cardiff Technical college, and later at the Royal Academy of arts, under Sir Arthur Cope, R. A., and George Clausen, R. A. She subsequently studied for some years in Italy, France and Holland.

Chief among her academy successes were the gold medals and travelling scholarship, the blue ribbon of the Royal Academy of Arts, for a historical picture entitled "The City of Refuge." She also secured the Crosswick prize, a much coveted honor.

Miss Williams had the distinction of being invited by the late G. A. Storey, R. A., Professor of Perspective at the Royal Academy, to assist with the illustrations for his book, "The theory and practice of Perspective."

Among the most notable of her paintings which have been hung at the Royal Academy and exhibited in most of the principal cities of the United Kingdom are, "Dives and Lazarus," "The City of Refuge," "The Registry at San Marco, Venice," "In the Shadow of the Palazzo, Rome," "His Majesty King Edward VII," "The Triumph," and "The Devil's Daughter."

Other paintings include "Her Majesty Queen Alexandra," (in Her Majesty's possession), "H. R. H. the Prince of Wales," (in the possession of Queen Mary), and "An Empire Tribute to the Flag of Stars," a large allegorical picture purchased by the late Captain I. B. Castell, commissioner of the American Red Cross for Wales during the war. This painting was exhibited at the Washington Red Cross headquarters, and at Denver, Colorado on Armistice Day, 1921.

It should be mentioned that Miss Williams has just completed a large picture of the scene in Westminster Abbey on the occasion of the great Welsh service held there in 1918. This canvas, which measures 180 feet by 10 feet, contains about 180 portraits of distinguished people.

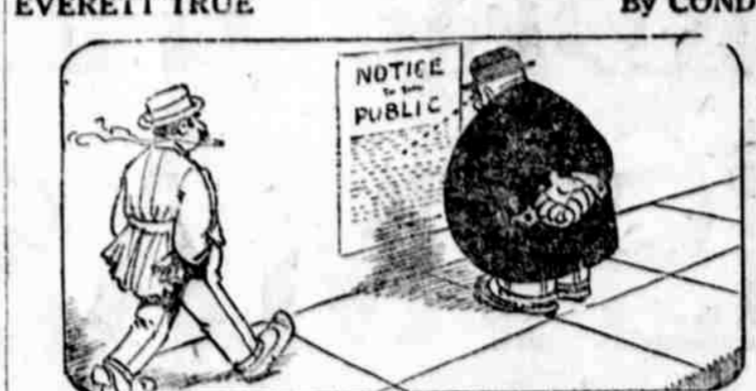
