**LIGHT, RACY PLAY GETS APPROVAL OF T. B. M. IN FRANCE**

PARIS, Dec. 20.—The people of Paris spend a quarter of a billion francs yearly on theatres and motion pictures, and do not care to do much heavy thinking during the process. Government statistics on last year's receipts of every playhouse in Paris warrant these statements, and at the same time supply interesting information about what pleases the tired business man of France and his non-voting wife.

Motion picture houses, which outnumber the regular theatres three to one, took in 59,000,000 francs in 1921, rather more than did the theatres, and a third of the total amusement receipts. Last year, however, the theatres took first place with receipts of 85,000,000 francs, 11,000,000 more than the movies. This increase seems to be due largely to the fact that theatregoers have mollified their oppositional attitude toward high prices of admission and also by a revival of the typically light and racy play.

The government-subsidized opera, and the opera comique, headed the list with the largest receipts, each taking in more than 9,000,000 francs last year, and the serious Comedie Francaise did well with 6,000,000 francs, but these institutions are virtually without competition in their field, and they represent a big portion of the money paid for the classics.

The Folies-Bergeres, where the big scenes always hinge on the presentation of a group of handsome show-girls, tops the list of theatres, exceeding even the famous Comedie Francaise. The next in line among the dramatic houses is the Palais Royal, which always pursues a policy of giving highly spiced comedies of family life.

**ERADICATION OF PREDATORY BEASTS AIM OF CATTLEMEN**

GILRAY, Cal., Dec. 20.—Eradication of the predatory mountain lions from the mountains back of Gilroy is being attempted by cattlemen of this vicinity, who have brought Jay Bruce, state lion hunter here to help stamp out the beasts.

Lions in recent years have killed a large number of cattle and sheep in the mountains grazing sections. Often they kill, according to cattlemen, without any desire to satisfy hunger. Unlimited destruction of wild life also is charged to the beasts.

Bruce has two highly-trained dogs who, he says, will not trail deer but will detect and follow the lions.

**ATHLETES OF WEST SUPREME**

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20.—Western athletes were supreme in various branches of sports during the year just closing. In football, boxing, track and field, wrestling, tennis, automobile racing and baseball the men from the far west continued high up among the leaders, several of them holding championships.

Probably the west's best known athlete is Jack Dempsey, heavy-weight boxing champion, Colorado-born and Utah-bred, Dempsey now resides in Los Angeles. Although he did little this year in the ring, it was only because a capable opponent could not be found.

World honors also came to the west in wrestling when Ed "Strangler" Lewis of San Jose, Cal., won the heavy-weight title from Stanislaus Zbyszko to whom he had lost it earlier. Lewis formerly was a resident of Kentucky but in recent years had made his home in California.

On the automobile speedways of the nation, a native Californian, Jimmy Murphy, whose residence is claimed by both Los Angeles and San Francisco, forged to the championship rung, taking the title from another Californian, Tommy Milton.

In college athletics the University of California retained its title of national intercollegiate track and field champion at Harvard last spring. Jack Merchant, California, was the individual star, his work in the hammer, discus, jumps and sprints causing easterners to call him the greatest all-round athlete of the year. Stanford university finished third in the Harvard meet, Glenn Hartranft, weight man and sprinter, making many of the Cardinal points, in track also, Bud Hauser, Oxnard, Cal., high school boy, won the national interscholastic shot put championship. Sprinters are still trying to break the world's cinder path records made in 1921 by Charles Paddock, Los Angeles, the "world's fastest human being." Paddock established more records this year and in 1923 will return to the university of Southern California for active competition.

California this year produced another great football team, said by many to be even greater than the "wonder team" of 1921 which blanketed Ohio state, Big Ten champions. "Brock" Muller, California's All-American end, and "Duke" Morrison, an All-American possibility, were stars on the team.

Western baseball players this year brought prices higher than ever before paid to minor league owners. Jimmy O'Connell and Willie Kamun of the San Francisco Seals and Sammy Hale of the Portland Beavers were sold for \$75,000, \$100,000 and \$75,000 respectively. The Golden State was represented on the world champion New York Giants by Geo. Kelly and Bill Cunningham.

Probably the most picturesque figure in the western golf world year was John Black, the grandfather golfer of Oakland, who was defeated in the national open tourney only by Gene Sarazen, present champion.

In tennis four of the ten ranking players of the country hailed from San Francisco and one of them, William M. Johnston, defeated the champion, William T. Tilden, at Berkeley early in the year. Helen Wills, a Berkeley girl, retained the national girls' title and was defeated in the national women's tournament only by the champion, Mrs. Molla Mallory.

If aeroplaning be ranked as a sport, it will be recalled that Lieut. L. R. Maughan of Mills, Cal., at Mt. Clemens, Mich., traveled at a speed of 248 miles an hour, and that Lieuts. Oakley Kelly and John MacReady, San Diego, Cal., together established a record by remaining in the air continuously for 29 hours and shortly afterward broke the world's non-stop flight record with a "hop" of 2,060 miles.

In swimming this year, however, the west had to submit almost meekly to the invasion of the phenomenal Johnnie Weismuller of the Illinois athletic club.

**Rare Minerals Are Sought In New Guinea**

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Dec. 20.—A prospecting party has left Sydney for the mandated territory of New Guinea in search of gold, platinum, osmium and iridium, with 500,000 pounds available for development of any deposits discovered. It is indicated that financial aid may be given by the Commonwealth government, in development if the prospecting party meets with success.
