

INTEREST GROWS IN FIELD SPORTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Growing popular interest in outdoor sports throughout the metropolitan area, especially in baseball and football, will result in largely increased accommodations for spectators in 1923, according to present indications. Conservative estimates place at 500,000 the total simultaneous seating capacity which scores of fields and a few larger stadia will have when plans now under way are completed.

While more than half of this capacity is scattered among smaller school, college and athletic club enclosures, approximately 210,000 will be accommodated in four big arenas. These are the three major league ball parks, Polo grounds, Yankee stadium and Ebbets field, and Baker field, Columbia's new stadium.

Yankee stadium, home of the American league baseball club in Bronx, is rapidly nearing completion and if not entirely finished will be ready, at any rate, for the formal opening of the 1923 baseball season in April. A 400 yards cinder path will offer facilities for track and field sports, while football and boxing also will be staged in the big arena, whose seating capacity will be from 70,000 to 80,000.

World's series attendance last fall at the Polo grounds exceeded all previous records there, and as a result the home of the New York Giants is being enlarged to seat 54,000, about 17,000 more than its present capacity. Football and boxing also figure as attractions at this field. Ebbets field, grounds of the Brooklyn national league club, with seating capacity of 22,000, has been used for boxing and occasionally football.

GRIM TRAGEDY STALKS THROUGH CROWDED SUBWAYS OF NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—The slam of a subway door, the surge of a rushing crowd and thousands of strangers, carried into the maelstrom of New York's great catacombs of commerce, the subways, are swept along—to disappointments, misfortune and often death. They form the bulk of the cases reported to the missing persons bureau of the police department. Few get public notice until they reach a tragic ending.
Not long ago Joseph Gallo of Fairfax, S. D., came east with his wife. They were to sail for their old home in Czecho-Slovakia to retire. Passage was engaged. They started from their hotel for the pier.
The subway was crowded. Gallo pushed his way through the crowds. His wife was close behind. But before she could board the train the guard had slammed the door, separating husband and wife.
She boarded the next train. It was the wrong one. Speaking little English she couldn't make herself understood. She was lost among millions.
Two days later the frantic husband understood. She was not among them. She had died of fright.
A few weeks later Hyman Levine, a Newark, N. J., grocer came to the dock to meet his wife and son, coming from Russia to join him.
Again a subway door closed. Another family was separated.
But this time fortune threw into the path of the panic-stricken woman a man who understood her language and who wasn't too busy to stop.
He escorted the lost mother and son to a police station. There the husband later found them. A repetition of the Gallo tragedy had been avoided.
After two years' hard work, two brothers decided to go back to Italy and spend Christmas with their old

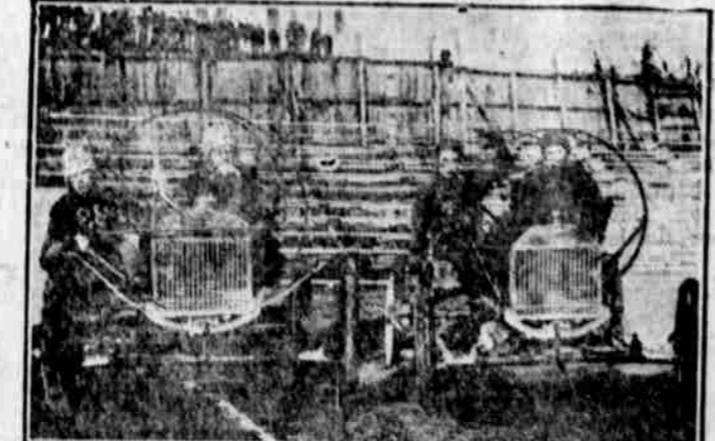
mother. They spent all their savings for passage on the Majestic on her last trip of the year. But they got lost in the subway and reached the pier in time to see the boat leaving. They could take no other boat. All their dreams were shattered.
According to officials at the Grand Central and Pennsylvania railroad stations, 50 persons a day miss their trains as a result of becoming lost in the subways. Police say hundreds are lost in New York daily.

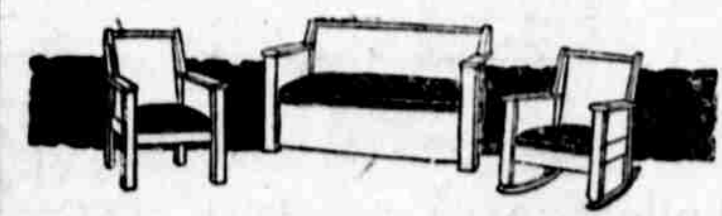
