

## NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND ELECTION

Of the Horsetail Irrigation District  
Of Klamath County, Oregon.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified electors and taxpayers of the Horsetail Irrigation District of Klamath County, Oregon, that the Board of Directors of said District, by resolution duly made and entered, have ordained a Special Bond Election to be held for by and within the said Horsetail Irrigation District on the 24th day of Jan. A. D. 1923 for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of certain hereinafter described bonds of said district.

The question to be submitted at said election is as follows:

SHALL THE HORSETAIL IRRIGATION DISTRICT ISSUE BONDS IN THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$135,000) THE PROCEEDS OF WHICH ARE TO BE USED IN MAKING THE FOLLOWING PAYMENTS, IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS FOR THE IRRIGATION OF ITS LAND, SAID BONDS TO BE USED FOR THE FOLLOWING PURPOSES, VIZ:

- (1) To pay the present outstanding indebtedness represented by bonds of the District \$78,000
- (2) For improvements of the system in the Big Springs Unit \$1,500
- (3) For improvements of the system in Unit No. One \$4,500
- (4) For improvements of the system in Unit No. Three \$4,000
- (5) For improvements of the system in Unit No. Four \$4,000
- (6) For improvements of the system in the Younger Unit \$7,000
- (7) For replacing three small dams in Lost River with concrete piers and permanent construction \$3,000
- (8) To provide an office and fixtures for the District \$1,000
- (9) To extend construction of ditches and build dunes, crossings, culverts and pumping plant for the newly admitted Dairy Unit of the District \$34,000

These bonds to be known as Series Two and Issue One, consist of 400 bonds numbered from 1 to 400 inclusive and be issued in denominations as follows: 30 of said bonds for the sum of \$1,000 each; 100 of said bonds for the sum of \$500 each; 100 of said bonds for the sum of \$250 each; and 150 of said bonds for the sum of \$100 each; they are to draw interest at the rate of six per cent per annum payable semi-annually on the 1st of January and July of each year, bear date of July 1st, 1923, and mature in fifteen equal annual installments of \$9,000 each, the first installment of \$9,000 to be due and payable on the first day of January A. D. 1924 and a like sum of \$9,000 to be due and payable on the first day of January of each succeeding year, up to and including the first day of January A. D. 1944.
