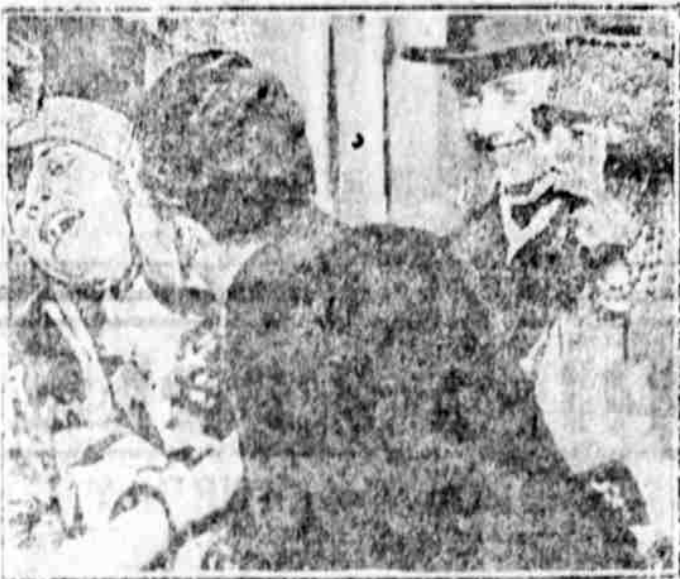


Fete Day of the Midinettes

SEEKS TRUTH GIVER

Doctor Would Experiment on Convicts With Twilight Sleep.

Believes That Under Influence of Anesthetic Subjects Will Tell All Facts About Crimes of Which They Are Accused.

Hot Springs, Tex., Dec. 19. Dr. E. E. House, physician, will probably continue his efforts to secure permission to conduct experiments on prisoners at the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., to demonstrate his theory that while under the influence of scopalamine anesthetic, or during "twilight sleep," subjects will tell the facts regarding crimes of which they are accused.

In addressing the convention here of the Medical Association of the Southwest, Doctor House said that he intended to use every effort to secure permission to make experiments on 1,500 prisoners, taking the stand that this number of experiments will prove his theory to the satisfaction of both physicians and criminologists.

The medical association failed to give its official endorsement to Doctor House's plan, but the subject was widely discussed in an informal manner, and much interest was expressed in the continuation of the experiments, which Doctor House says have been under way for several years and have brought invariable satisfactory results.

In the informal discussion of his paper the physician emphasized that the results of his experiments could not be expected to stand as evidence in any court, but claimed that the facts obtained through questioning of accused persons or witnesses during the period of "twilight sleep" could be advantageously used by authorities in the solution of many mysterious crimes, and in dozens of instances would prevent a miscarriage of justice, even if the real criminal was not brought to justice.

In one experiment in Dallas, which he cited to the association, he said that a man under arrest, charged with a serious crime, seemed almost certain of conviction on circumstantial evidence. "Twilight sleep" was induced without the prisoner's knowledge, and he gave information which, when checked up by the Dallas police, proved the man's innocence and resulted in his acquittal.

The physician held that, when his theory has been adequately proved by thorough experiment in hundreds of cases, a new field in criminal investigation will be opened up, which will not only prove a powerful aid in the detection of criminals, but will also become a great protection to those unjustly accused of crime.

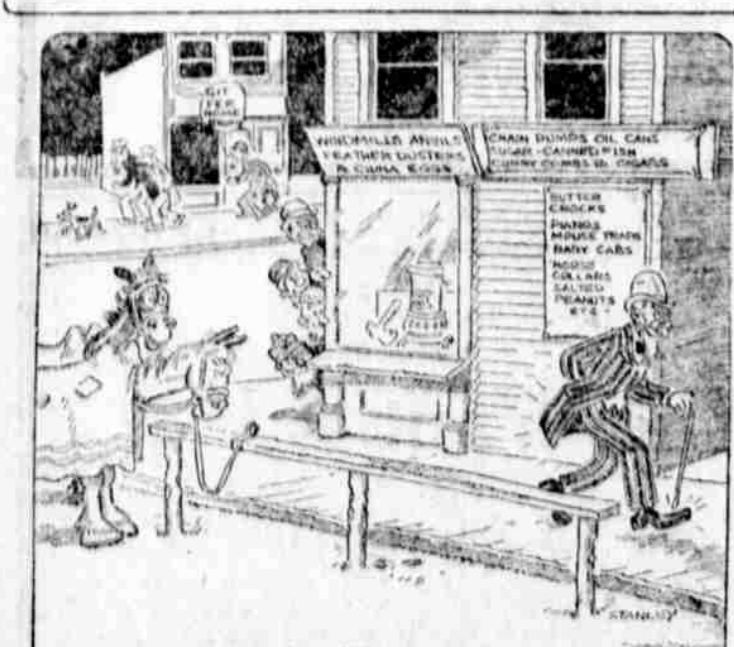

ETHER AND ICE CREAM



Ether has been adapted to a new role of usefulness by P. N. Peter, chemist of the dairy division of the United States Department of Agriculture. Mr. Peter recently discovered its value as an agent in determining the expansion in force when freezing ice cream. It is the first time that ether has been applied in the process of refrigeration. The apparatus consists of a large Dewar flask wrapped in heavy felt.

KRAUT YIELD IS 155,000 TONS

Wisconsin Cabbage Growers Report Bumper Crop; Onion Harvest Also Huge. Milwaukee, Wis.—Wisconsin, second state in the Union in cabbage production, will turn out 155,000 tons of sauer kraut this fall, according to the estimate of Joseph A. Becker, crop reporting service. Last year's kraut shortage was the result of a meager harvest of 37,000 tons of cabbage.

The fragrant onion has also bloomed and Mr. Becker imparts to the enthusiast that a great harvest of 307,000 bushels is expected, compared to 100,000 bushels last year. Third ranking state in potatoes, Wisconsin will have 37,433,000 bushels, compared to a five-year average of 28,751,000 bushels.
