BRITISH TROOPS IN GERMANY HAVE COST \$270,000,000

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The strength
of the British army of occupation
in Germany on November first was
552 officers and 8,138 men of
other rank, according to Walter
Guinness, under secretary to the
war department.
The total cost of maintenance,
exclusive of accommodation and
miscellaneous services, from the ar-
mistice to July 31, 1922 amounted
to 54,658,000 pounds sterling.
