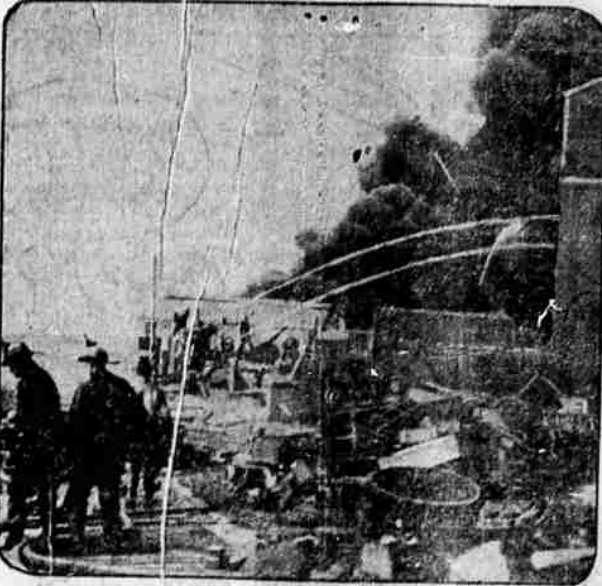

START BABIES RIGHT

RENO, Nev., June 27.—The child welfare division of the Nevada state board of health, assured of a working capital of \$16,000 from state and federal funds, is making preparations to start activities at once under the provisions of the Sheppard-Towner bill. The state will be divided into seven districts and a trained child welfare nurse will be placed in charge of each district. Instructions will be given to mothers in prenatal, bathing, sanitation, and general care of babies and children. Nurses will be placed in communities where the need is greatest.

SAN JOSE, Calif., June 27.—Because the almanac shows that the sun rose in San Jose at 6:10 o'clock on the morning of March 17, last, Calvin Edwards, recently convicted of burglary here, will go to the state prison at San Quentin in facing a term of one to five years instead of one to fifteen years. The evidence showed that the burglary took place at 6:45 a. m. Under the California law, a daylight burglary carries a lighter sentence than if the breaking and entry were made during the hours of darkness.
