PLAGUE RAGES IN INDIA

BOMBAY, India, June 29.—Bubonic plague is raging throughout British India as it has not raged for five years. The disease threatens to become epidemic, and already has been the cause of panic in several of the larger cities.

The rise in this plague year began in December. During the month of March 36,999 deaths were recorded, against an average for the previous four years for the same month of 14,423.

The governmental authorities ascribe the plague to rats getting in to the grain, and advise the people to build rat-proof grain warehouses and to destroy the rodents.
