## PREPARATIONS FOR RODEO OCCUPY SOCIETY'S TIME

This week, as last, preparations for the Southern Oregon rodeo, which begins Monday, have occupied the greater part of society's time. The city presents a festive appearance, with its gay decorations of flags and bunting, and the coming week promises to be the liveliest and most interesting ever enjoyed in Klamath county. The regatta tomorrow will be an event of unusual interest, since it will be the first ever to be held here. The festivities really begin tonight at the White Pelican hotel when Miss Ruth Lindsay will be crowned queen of the rodeo.

## CORONATION BALL TO BE HELD AT WHITE PELICAN

Miss Ruth Lindsay, elected to rule during the rodeo, will be crowned queen tonight in the ballroom of the White Pelican hotel. At the same time the prizes won by her and those won by the three maids-of-honor will be presented.

With all the pomp and ceremony befitting this royal occasion the crown will be placed on the brow of Queen Ruth, while the coronation speech will be made by Wilson S. Wiley. The maids of honor are Miss Maxine Bradbury, Miss Mary Jenkins and Miss Josephine Melander and these will tonight, as during the rodeo, join the royal retinue. After the coronation, dancing to music furnished by a seven piece orchestra will entertain the coronation party until midnight.
